<p>This Development Brief covers an area around the commercial core of Uig which lies immediately to the west of the Harbour (shown in Map 1.1). The fundamental purpose of the Brief is to provide a structured framework for the physical development and transformation of the area over the next 20 years. A key part of this is to identify and coordinate development and regeneration opportunities which may arise from Transport Scotland's investment in the Skye Triangle ferry routes which includes a new and improved ferry vessel and major upgrade of Uig Harbour.</p>
