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1 Introduction

Local Place Plans

Local Place Plans were introduced by the Scottish Government as a way for community bodies (Community Councils and Community-Controlled Bodies) to engage with members of their local community, to find out their community's aims and aspirations for the development and/or use of land and buildings in their local area, and to encourage involvement with the planning process.

The right for communities to prepare Local Place Plans was introduced through changes brought about by the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019ⁱ. The statutory requirements for Local Place Plans are set out in The Town and Country Planning (Local Place Plans) (Scotland) Regulations 2021ⁱⁱ. Planning Circular 1/2022: Local Place Plansⁱⁱⁱ contains guidance for communities preparing Local Place Plans.

Strathdearn Local Place Plan

Strathdearn covers the rural parish of Moy, Dalarossie, and Tomatin, and is located by the River Findhorn, 15 miles south of Inverness. Strathdearn Community Council is a statutory body that exists to make sure that the local voices in Strathdearn are heard by local and national organisations.

Strathdearn Local Place Plan is the fourth community plan to be prepared for the whole Strathdearn area, with three Strathdearn community studies published in 2006, 2011, and 2022, and one Moy community study published in 2016. The most recent community study for the whole Strathdearn area is the Strathdearn Community Action Plan 2022-2027. The Strathdearn Local Place Plan serves to combine the requirements of a Local Place Plan with those of a Community Action Plan, and thus it serves to identify the local community's needs, including its needs around spaces and places.

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation – carrying out the community engagement, developing the vision, actions and proposals, and conducting the statutory consultation – was led by Strathdearn Community Council, with valuable support from Strathdearn Community Charitable Trust (SCO37168) and Strathdearn Community Developments (SCO44487). The Strathdearn Local Place Plan was prepared between end-September 2025 and end-June 2026.

Community Engagement

Strathdearn Community Council carried out a wide range of community engagement activities as part of its preparations for the Strathdearn Local Place Plan, to find out the aims and aspirations of the local community. The engagement activities were designed to reach the full range of ages in the community from toddlers to older people, and included an online and paper survey, drop-in sessions, face-to-face chats, focus groups, comment boards, and drawing activities.

Comments were received from local residents, landowners, community groups, businesses operating in Strathdearn, Strathdearn Primary School, and Strathdearn Church of Scotland. The Local Place Plan community engagement activities included representatives from Strathdearn Community Council, Strathdearn Community Developments, White River Trading, and the Moy Sub-Committee.

The Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan statutory consultation opened on 13/05/2026 and closed on 12/06/2026, allowing 30 days for representations from Councillors within the Local Place Plan area, Community Councils adjoining the Local Place Plan area, and the local and wider community.

National and Local Policy

National Planning Framework

The Strathdearn Local Place preparation had regard to the National Planning Framework 4 (NPF4) (2023)^{iv}, which sets out the Scottish Government's national spatial principles, regional priorities, national developments, and overarching planning policy themes (Sustainable Places, Liveable Places, Productive Places), and to the NPF4 delivery programme V4 (2026)^v.

Local Development Plans

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation had regard to the three local development plans that cover its area. The Local Place Plan area is mainly located in The Highland Council development plans area and accordingly, it had regard to the following two Highland Council local development plans:

- Highland-wide Local Development Plan (HwLDP) (2012)^{vi}
- Inner Moray Firth Local Development Plan 2 (IMFLDP2) (2024)^{vii}

A small part of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is located in the Cairngorms National Park (CNP) and accordingly, the Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation also had regard to the Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan (CNPLDP) (2021)^{viii}.

Locality Plans

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is mainly located in the Inverness Community Partnership area^{ix}, for which there is currently no formal Locality Plan, but there is a Draft Inverness Area Locality Plan (2024)^x, which accordingly, the Local Place Plan preparation had regard to. A small part of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is located in the Badenoch and Strathspey Community Partnership area^{xi}, for which there is currently no formal Locality Plan.

Superseded Local Plans

Change is a constant for any area, as reflected by the changing adopted land-use plans for an area. This Local Place Plan makes reference to previous Local Plans for Strathdearn, which while no longer part of the adopted Development Plan – and thus hold no statutory weight in the consideration of land use and development in Strathdearn – still serve to provide useful context for the local area. The superseded Local Plans referred to in this Strathdearn Local Place Plan are:

- Inner Moray Firth Local Development Plan (IMFLDP) (adopted 2015, superseded by IMFLDP2)
- Inverness Local Plan (INLP) (adopted 2006, superseded by HwLDP and IMFLDP)

How will the Strathdearn Local Place Plan be used?

Strathdearn Local Place Plan will be used at a local community level, from 2026 to 2031, to:

- guide Strathdearn Community Developments in their action, resourcing, and future spend for the benefit of Strathdearn, including the allocation of community benefit funds.
- provide Strathdearn Community Council with a point of reference for responding to planning applications.
- support funding bids for community proposals contained in the Strathdearn Local Place Plan.

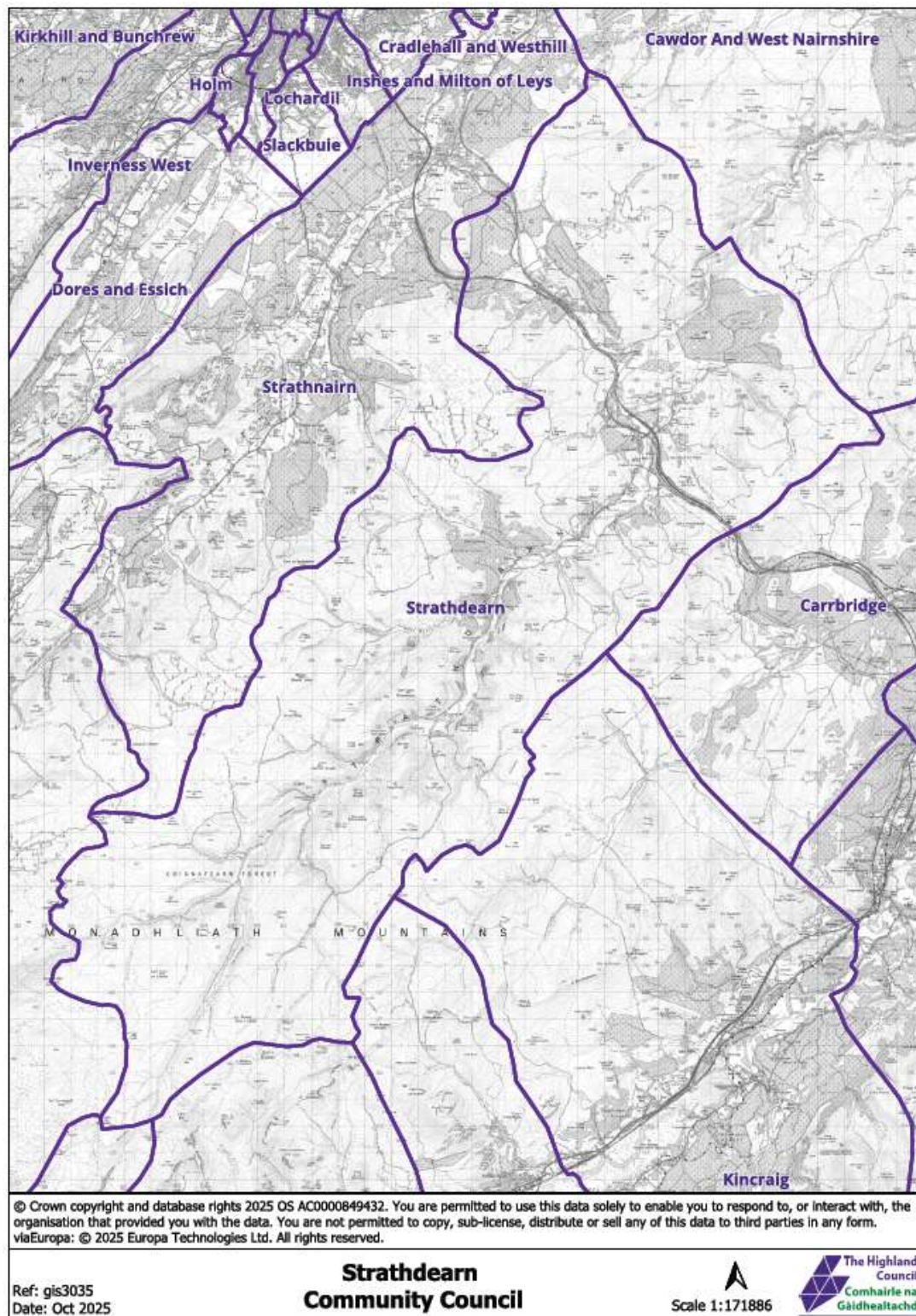
Strathdearn Local Place Plan will also be used by The Highland Council, the Cairngorms National Park, and by other national or local public agencies to guide the development of policy, decision-making,

and investment for the Strathdearn area, to assist the community to grow in a sustainable manner and ensure that public maintenance of the area is delivered to a standard comparable to services delivered within other communities across Highland.

Strathdearn Local Place Plan will remain on The Highland Council's online register until it is removed or replaced by Strathdearn Community Council (www.highland.gov.uk/localplaceplanregister).

2 Local Place Plan area map

The Strathtearn Local Place Plan area matches the same land contained within the Strathtearn Community Council area boundary, as shown in Map 1.



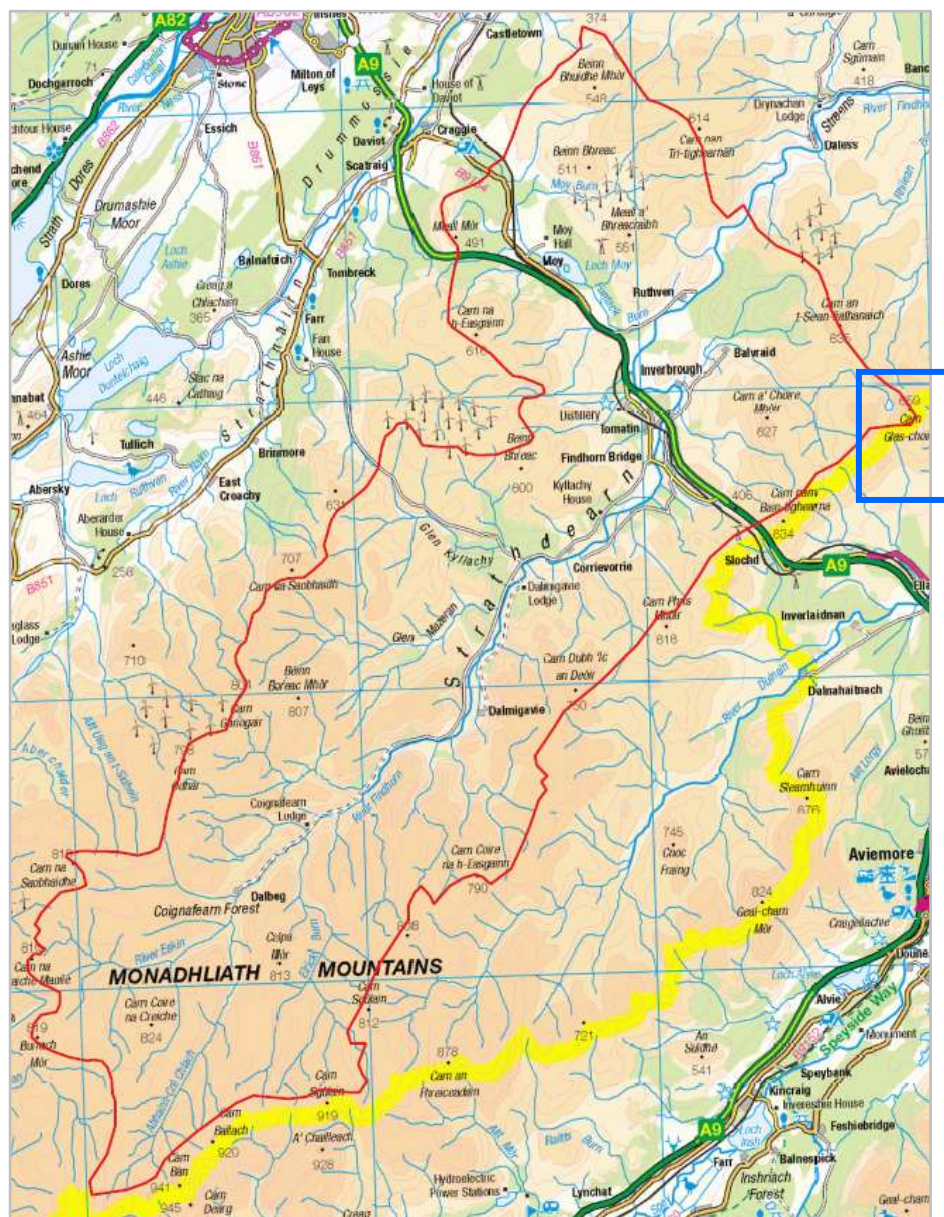
Map 1: Strathtearn Community Council area^{xii}

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area (see red boundary line in Map 2) is located mainly within The Highland Council development plans area. A small part of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area also lies within the Cairngorms National Park (the yellow line in Map 2 is the Park Authority boundary).

The main part of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area that is also in the Cairngorms National Park, is in the location of the 659-metre-high Fiona Càrn Glas-choire^{xiii}, as shown in the blue box in Map 2. Fionas are mountains in Scotland that are between 609.6 and 762 metres high and have at least 150 metres of descent on all sides^{xiv}.

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area boundary follows the watershed of the upper River Findhorn. Strathdearn forms part of the wider Monadhliath Mountains. The Strath, a much-treasured peaceful place with a sense of remoteness, is the part of the Strathdearn area that is located upstream of the A9 trunk road (as shown in green and yellow in Map 2).

3 Strathdearn area description and context

Location

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area covers the rural parish of Moy, Dalarossie, and Tomatin, and is situated by the River Findhorn, about 15 miles from Inverness.

The Local Place Plan area is chiefly covered by postcode area IV13, with small areas of PH23 to the east, IV2 to the north and west, and PH32 to the south. The Local Place Plan area is mainly within The Highland Council development plans area, with a small part of the Local Place Plan area also covered by the Cairngorms National Park development plans area.

The Urban Rural Classification^{xvi} for most of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is 'Remote Rural Areas', with the area containing Tomatin, Moy, and the A9 classed as 'Accessible Rural Areas'.

According to [Scottish Government's Spatial Data Map](#)^{xvii}, the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area has a Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) 2020 rank of 4 (noting that Government's SIMD ranking goes from 1 (most deprived) to 5 (least deprived)). However, it should be noted that SIMD is an [area-based measure of relative deprivation](#)^{xviii}, with SIMD data zones in rural areas tending to cover large areas of land with a mixed picture of people experiencing different levels of deprivation; this means that SIMD is less helpful at identifying the smaller pockets of deprivation found in more rural areas.

Strathdearn's main settlement, Tomatin, was shaped by General Wade's Military Road, the River Findhorn, the distillery, railway, and the A9 trunk road. The roads running through Tomatin and Moy are the C1121 and B9154 respectively, with both also known locally as the 'old A9'. The A9 trunk road that bypassed Tomatin and Moy, cuts through land that once held Tomatin's 9-hole golf course^{xix}.

Population

The Strathdearn population was 674 in the Census 2022. The Strathdearn Community Council area has an area of 428km² ^{xx}, which equates to a population density of 1.57 persons/km². The Census 2022 shows a **7% increase in the total population in Strathdearn** and a 44% increase in residents aged 65 years or over since the Census 2011 (see Table 1). Strathdearn has around 330 households.

The percentage of the Strathdearn population aged 65 and over in the Census 2022 is 18.5%, which is similar to the population aged 65 and over in Highland (23.7%) and in Scotland as a whole (22.5%)^{xxi}.

Facilities and services

The Local Place Plan area features a primary school, churches, hall, café, shop, covered sports pitch, publicly accessible toilets, two play park areas, community woodland, two burial grounds, and a

recycling point. The publicly accessible toilets are located at the community-owned hall and are opened by the community for public use, supported by the Highland Council comfort scheme^{xxiii}.

The Local Place Plan area has one primary school, Strathdearn Primary School, which has capacity for 75 pupils. In September 2025, Strathdearn Primary's school roll was [35 primary](#)^{xxiv} and [12 nursery](#)^{xxv} pupils, which is a respective decrease and increase on the 39 primary and eight nursery children in September 2021^{xxvi}, and an **overall retention in pupil numbers over the four year-period to 2025**.

The Strathdearn area has no secondary school. Strathdearn Primary School is in the catchment for Millburn Academy in Inverness. Highland Council school transport collects primary and secondary pupils each school day from Coignafearn and within and takes them to Tomatin and Inverness.

There are a total of three bus services servicing the Local Place Plan area: The Highland Council (300), Stagecoach (37), and Ember (E9). There is a weekly Post Office at The Strathdearn hall, and the Dingwall and Moray Firth Mobile Library service has regular stops at Tomatin, Lynebeg, and Moy.

The Church parish of Moy and Dalarossie has an active congregation using The Strathdearn Hub and the Free Presbyterian church at Morile at the south gateway to Tomatin village. Dalarossie Church has four services a year at the kind arrangement of the new custodians.

Strathdearn is serviced by mobile communications, and a large part of the area has superfast fibre broadband installed. Water is provided via a water treatment works in Tomatin, which opened in 2021, plus many properties (approximately 50) in Moy, Tomatin, and the Strath have private water supplies^{xxvii}. The wastewater treatment plant in Tomatin, which was constructed in the 1990s, has limited capacity; it is only properties in the centre of Tomatin village that are connected to the wastewater plant, and many properties in Strathdearn have private wastewater arrangements.

Housing

The [Census 2011](#)^{xxviii} data shows that the majority of housing in the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is detached or semi-detached. Just over half of the houses in the Local Place Plan area are owned, with council or other social housing totalling less than 10% of the housing available in Strathdearn. The Census 2011 housing figures for Strathdearn are similar to the Census 2001 figures quoted in the Strathdearn Community Action Plan 2022-27^{xxix}; except for houses rented from a private landlord, which equated to just over 20% in the Census 2001, but had reduced to 13.1% in the Census 2011.

In 2026, the construction of six community-owned affordable houses was completed in Tomatin within easy walking distance to the primary school and other local facilities. The leasing of the community-owned housing is being managed by the Communities Housing Trust.

Business and employment

Many of the businesses operating in Strathdearn are linked to food and drink (Tomatin Distillery and visitor centre and the community-owned café in Tomatin); holiday accommodation; and land-based activities, such as farming (including crofting), forestry, and country sports. There are trades working from home bases, including builders, electricians, and joiners. There has been a growth in home workers linked to broadband, new meeting spaces in The Strathdearn Hub, and improving transport links, with activities range from consulting to research. Local employment in the Strathdearn area is closely linked to tourism, which in turn links closely to the local landscape.

Landscape

The 100km/62-mile River Findhorn, one of the longest rivers in Scotland, is a significant natural feature in the Local Place Plan area. Its upper river, from its source to the west of Coignafearn, to Tomatin, flows through open hill and moorland with large areas of peat, while its middle river flows from Tomatin to Sluie through heather hill and gravel banks and rocky gorge^{xxx}.

The key landscape characteristics of the Local Place Plan area include smooth rounded hills, open heather moorland, small patches of woodland, single track roads, uninhabited interior largely inaccessible to vehicles, striking colour and textural contrast between strath floors and moorland vegetation above, and expansive views from the hill tops and plateaux that create a strong sense of openness and exposure. The Strath is approximately 22-miles long and extends from the headwaters of the River Findhorn, following the river's course through the parishes of Dalarossie, Tomatin, and Moy. The Strath is characterised by its strong perception of remoteness, though this characteristic of the local landscape has been affected by the wind farm development^{xxxi}.

The southern part of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan lies within the Monadhliath Mountains. The Local Place Plan area also features the Drynachan, Lochindorb and Dava Moors Special Landscape Area^{xxxii} to the north-east and the Monadhliath Wild Land Area 20^{xxxiii} to the south-west.

Heritage

Built heritage in the Local Place Plan area includes the A-listed Aultnaslanach Viaduct in Moy, which is the only wooden trestle railway bridge on a Scottish mainline railway^{xxxiv}. Also, the B-listed bridges spanning the Findhorn at Tomatin: the Findhorn Viaduct and the Findhorn Bridge.

Other listed structures include Eilean nan Clach crannog in Loch Moy, the Moy Obelisk on the island in Loch Moy, Tomatin Railway Viaduct, Dalarossie Church, and Dalarossie and Moy burial grounds^{xxxv}.

Built heritage features in Strathdearn, including hut circles and cairns, can be found in the Historic Environment Scotland Collections (trove.scot)^{xxxvi} using the search term [Strathdearn](#)^{xxxvii}.

The 'Strathdearn Community Timeline' on the Highland Historic Environment Record includes details of features such as the 1950s housing on Old Mill Road in Tomatin, shielings near Clune, and local memories of sites such as the Tomatin Curling Pond^{xxxviii}.

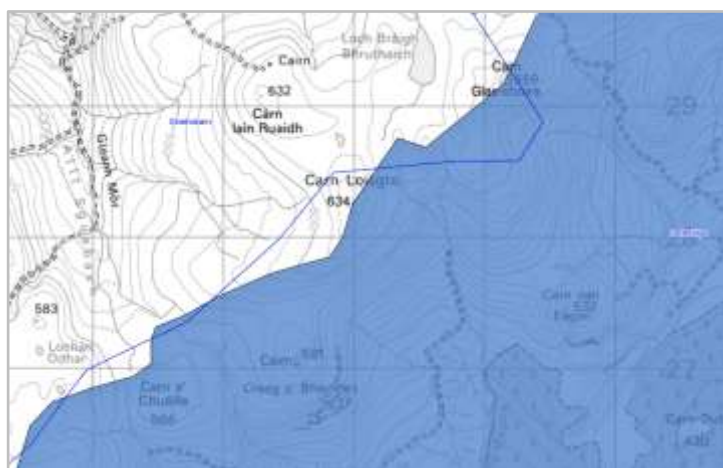
Information on the Gaelic place names of Strathdearn from Transactions of the Gaelic Society of Inverness, based on material collected over the course of two-months in 1919, can be found on the Strathdearn website^{xxxix}, and in the original Transaction Volume XXX on the *Am Baile* website^{xl}.

Outdoor access

Outdoor access in the Local Place Plan area is aided by three Core Paths, one of which is part of the National Cycle Network Route 7^{xli}. The [Strathdearn Access Map](#)^{xlii} (SCD, 2021) gives suggested walking and cycling routes, and signposts to places of interest, including Jacobite sites, such as General Wade's Military Road, and items of historic interest, such as the [life-size replica of the Invereen Pictish stone](#)^{xliii}.

4.1 Policy in the Strathdearn context

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is covered by two planning authorities. The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is mainly within The Highland Council development plans area, with a small part of its Local Place Plan area also being within the boundary of the Cairngorms National Park. The area covered by both planning authorities consists mainly of a small area of land at the north-east boundary of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area, in the location of the Fiona Càrn Glas-choire (see Map 2 above and Map 3 below), with some other smaller areas on the Strathdearn Local Place Plan boundary also covered by both planning authorities.

It should be noted that where this Local Place Plan refers to Supplementary Guidance, this refers to guidance that has been adopted as part of the Local Development Plan, and which holds the same status as the adopted Local Development Plan. When the emerging Local Development Plans are adopted, Supplementary Guidance will cease to be a statutory part of the Local Development in its current adopted form, which for the Cairngorms National Park, is expected to be by 2028 and for The Highland Council, is expected to be in 2029/2030 (see Chapter 4.3.4 for more details).

Regulation 2 of *The Town and Country Planning (Local Place Plans) (Scotland) Regulations 2021*^{xvii} also statutorily requires Local Place Preparation to have regard to any Locality Plans for the Local Place

Plan area, as is therefore also indicated in Table 2 for the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area, noting that Locality Plans do not form part of the adopted statutory development plan.

As the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is covered by two planning authorities – The Highland Council development plans area and the Cairngorms National Park – Strathdearn Community Council sought clarification as to which of these two authorities would be the validation authority for the purpose of validation checking and registering the Strathdearn Local Place Plan.

The Highland Council Development Plans Team confirmed in March 2026 that The Highland Council is the validation authority for checking and registering the Strathdearn Local Place Plan, and will inform the Cairngorms National Park Planning Authority when the Strathdearn Local Place Plan is registered.

Note: For the preparation of any future development proposals for the Strathdearn community, the policy documents applicable to the local area at that current time must be read as a whole.

4.2 National Planning Framework 4

[National Planning Framework 4 \(NPF4\)](#)^{xlvii} sets out the national spatial strategy and associated policies for the development or use of land and buildings in Scotland.

NPF4 has six overarching spatial principles: JUST TRANSITION, CONSERVING AND RECYCLING ASSETS, LOCAL LIVING, COMPACT URBAN GROWTH, REBALANCED DEVELOPMENT, RURAL REVITALISATION, and 33 policies designed to help NPF4 meet its three key spatial themes of Sustainable Places, Liveable Places, and Productive Places. Under the NPF4 theme of Productive Places, development proposals linked to community ownership and management of land are supported by Policy 25(b).

The eighteen national developments set out in NPF4 are to help Scottish Government deliver its spatial strategy for Scotland. Of these national developments, the following is impactful to the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area: **National Development 3**. Strategic Renewable Electricity Generation and Transmission Infrastructure – this Scotland-wide national development supports renewable electricity generation, repowering, and expansion of the electricity grid, to help meet the Scotland’s net zero emissions targets (aligns with an NPF4 key spatial theme: Sustainable Places).

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan area lies within NPF4's 'North region', which it describes being as renowned for its stunning landscape, rich biodiversity and cultural heritage. The North region's extensive areas of woodland and peatland, coupled with few sources of industrial significant industrial emissions, means that emissions in this region are partly offset by climate sequestration from the area acting like a net carbon sink. The North region's economic sectors, including tourism, food and drink, distilling, and clean energy, are sustained by key characteristics of the area, including its environmental quality, landscape, and wildlife.

NPF4 states that people in the North region's rural heartland often depend on the car, an ageing population will put pressure on some services, and population decline is an ongoing risk – there are long standing issues of affordability of homes in rural areas, coupled with the challenges of fuel and transport poverty, and there needs to be more alternatives to low skilled and low paid jobs.

The NPF4 (2023: 26) national spatial strategy for the North Region aims to:

- "Protect environmental assets and stimulate investment in natural and engineered solutions to climate change and nature restoration, whilst decarbonising transport and building resilient connections" to deliver **sustainable places**.
- "Maintain and help to grow the population by taking a positive approach to rural development that strengthens networks of communities" to deliver **liveable places**.
- "Support local economic development by making sustainable use of the area's world-class environmental assets to innovate and lead greener growth" to deliver **productive places**.

4.3 Local Development Plans

4.3.1 Highland-wide Local Development Plan

The Highland-wide Local Development Plan (2012) contains policies that apply to the whole of The Highland Council Development Plans area. The Highland-wide Local Development Plan policies of interest to the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area are the Spatial Strategy - General Policies, as the key locations within the Strathdearn Local Place Plan are not included in the area-specific policies.

The Highland-wide Local Development Plan states on page 180 that Chapter 25 (Tomatin) of the Inverness Local Plan (2006) is to continue in force; however, Chapter 25 was superseded when the Inner Moray Firth Local Development Plan (2015) was adopted.

The Highland-wide Local Development Plan will continue to be part of the adopted development plan for the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area until it is replaced by the new Highland Local Development Plan, which is due to be adopted in 2029/2030 (see Chapter 4.3.4).

4.3.2 Inner Moray Firth Local Development Plan 2

The Strathdearn-specific information in IMFLDP2 is focused on Tomatin, which it describes as a small village and a Tier 3 main settlement, with partially sustainable, local scale growth^{xlviii}

The IMFLDP2 Placemaking Priorities for Tomatin (see Figure 1) relate to housing, business, transport (active travel, rail, electric vehicle charging, and car parking), and biodiversity. The local community has achieved several of the IMFLDP2 placemaking priorities, with the completion of the community-owned affordable housing, installation of electric charging at The Strathdearn Hub, and purchase of Hazelbank Community Wood. The Moy community is currently in discussion with Forestry and Land Scotland regarding a Forestry Management Agreement for an area of woodland in Moy.

Placemaking Priorities 32

Tomatin

- Create a new mixed-use development close to the A9 junction to take advantage of its upgrade and the passing trade and employment opportunities that may flow from it.
- Develop new housing, particularly affordable housing to help retain young people and attract new people to the community.
- Create a continuous active travel connection between Tomatin and Moy.
- Undertake a Scottish Transport Appraisal Guidance (STAG) study to explore potential for reinstating a rail halt to enhance public transport options for residents, attract business and tourists and reduce traffic on A9.
- Consider vehicle parking improvements at the community hub, including provision of EV charging points and disabled spaces.
- Preserve and enhance green networks within and around the settlement, particularly areas of woodland and watercourses, for the benefit of active travel use and biodiversity.

Figure 1: IMFLDP2 Placemaking priorities for Tomatin ^{xlix}

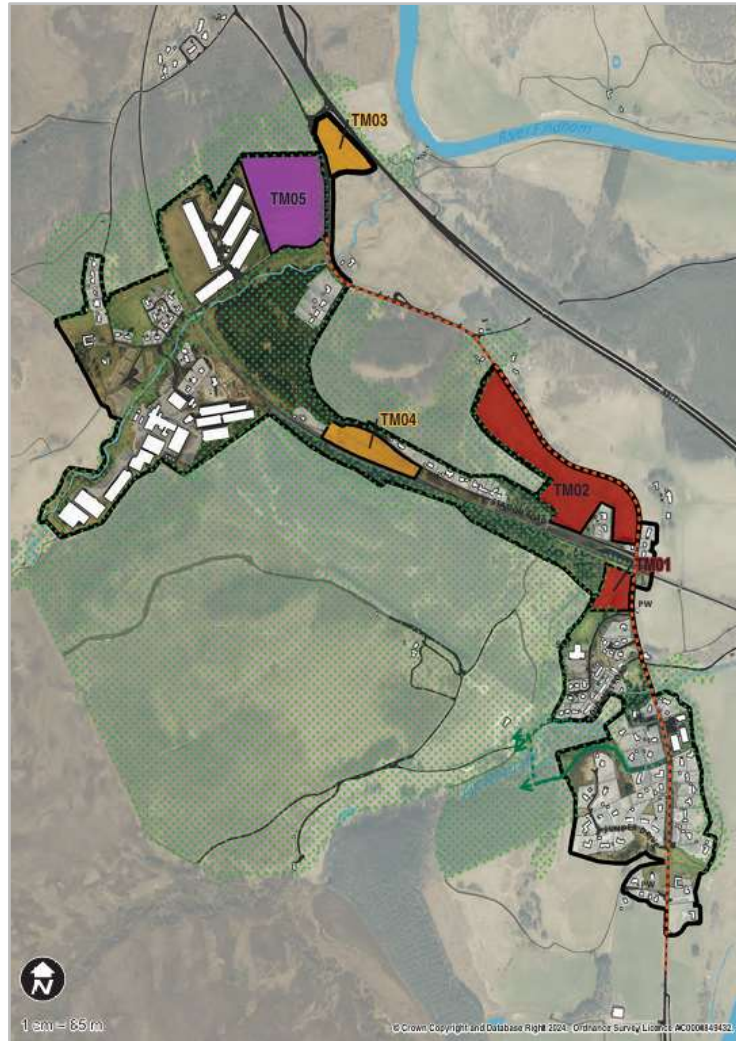
The IMFLDP2 Development Allocations for the Strathdearn area are all located in Tomatin Settlement Development Area (SDA) (see Map 4) (the legend for Map 4 is shown in Figure 2). A summary of the current development status for Tomatin's Development Allocations, to the best of Strathdearn Community Council's knowledge, is provided in Table 3 below.

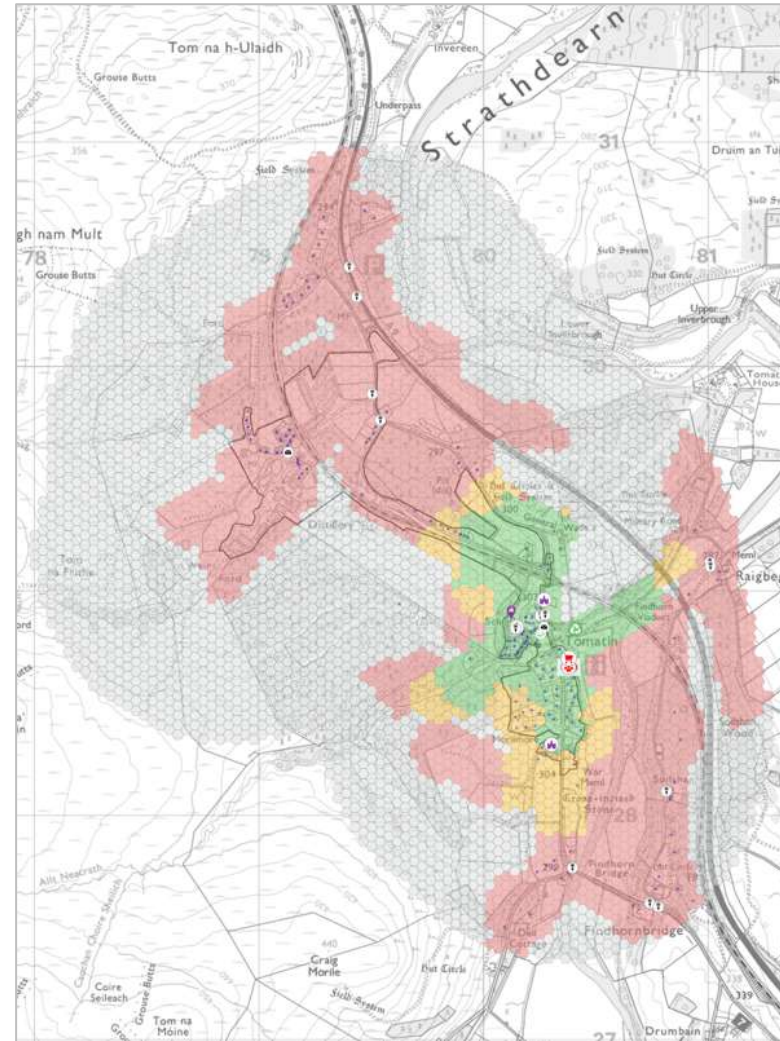

The IMFLDP2 Development Allocations map for Tomatin (see Map 4) includes [‘green networks’](#)^{lviii} across the Tomatin Settlement Development Area, including the whole of Distillery Wood (which also features two Core Paths), part of Hazelbank Community Wood, and around the east and south sides of The Strathdearn Hub. The inclusion of green network in the Local Development Plan is to promote greenspace linkages and safeguard and enhance wildlife corridors.

According to IMFLDP2 (page 377), green networks “...may serve one or more of the same functions as greenspaces but in a less formal or more strategic way. Green networks provide the physical, visual and habitat connections for greenspaces and therefore ensure accessibility for both wildlife and people. Development can be more flexibly accommodated within or adjacent to a green network as long as the network's connectivity and integrity is maintained and it is incorporated into a development as a positive landscape and design feature”. Note: Greenspaces have formal protection from development; there are no areas of greenspace mapped in the IMFLDP2 Tomatin SDA.

The IMFLDP2 Development Allocations map for Tomatin indicates an active travel route from the south end of Tomatin village along the C1121 (the ‘old A9’) to the entrance of the road that leads to Tomatin Distillery. Due to recent speed reductions, parts of this indicated active travel route is now designated as 20mph or 30mph, while part of the indicated route remains as national speed limit.

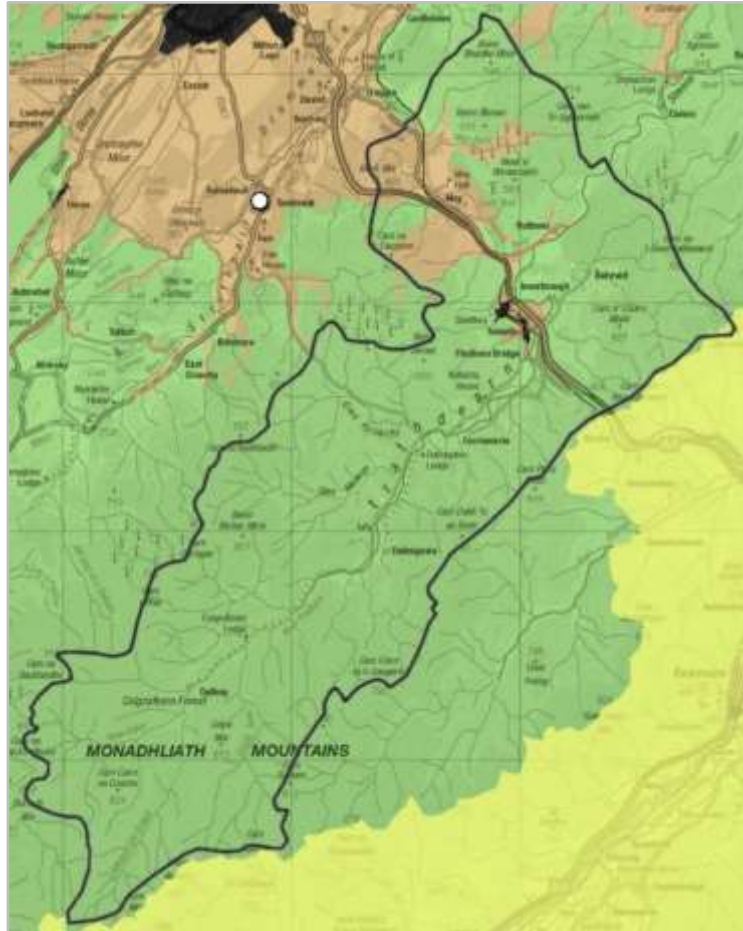
Regarding wastewater, IMFLDP2 states that there is limited capacity at Tomatin’s treatment works and encourages all prospective developers to engage early with Scottish Water to assess the impact of development and identify whether further works are necessary to the current facilities.

The north-west part of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is in the [IMFLDP2 Hinterland Area](#)^{lix}, where The Highland Council’s spatial strategy for new housing development in the open countryside aims to minimise adverse environmental and economic effects.

The Highland Council’s Rural Housing Supplementary Guidance^{lx} indicates the planning policy that is applied to proposed housing in the countryside, depending on the proposed location, which for Strathdearn, as shown on the Council’s Rural Housing Policy Map (see Map 6), is outlined below:

- **Black area in Strathdearn** (this is the Tomatin Settlement Development Area (SDA) in IMFLDP2)
In this area, NPF4 Policy 16 applies. This policy includes support for proposals for new homes on land allocated that is allocated for housing use in the LDP, and support for housing that improves affordability, including affordable homes and self-provided homes (self-build).
- **Brown area in Strathdearn** (includes a large part of Tomatin, Moy, and Ruthven)
Refer to NPF4 Policy 17(a) and/or the Housing Group Exception in the Council’s Rural Housing Supplementary Guidance. NPF4 Policy 17(a) includes support for a housing site allocated for land within the LDP, and support for the reuse of brownfield land, and for housing demonstrated to be necessary to support the sustainable management of a viable rural business or croft.

- **Green area in Strathdearn** (includes part of Tomatin, and the Strath, which includes Dalarossie)
Refer to NPF4 Policy 17(a), 17(b) and/or 17(c). In addition to some of the support provided by NPF4 Policy 17(a), as described directly above, Policy 17(b) gives consideration to Local Living and affordable housing, while Policy 17(c) includes supporting identified local housing outcomes.

4.3.3 Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan

The Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan (2021)^{lxii} does not explicitly refer to Strathdearn, Tomatin, Moy or Dalarossie. In addition, the following is noted:

- The Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan Settlements (strategic, intermediate, rural) are not located near to the north-west boundary of the Cairngorms National Park.
- There are no Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan (2021) development allocations located in the vicinity of the area of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan that is within the Cairngorms National Park Core Paths Plan (see Map 2).
- There are no Core Paths near the north-west boundary of the Cairngorms National Park in the Cairngorms National Park Core Paths Plan (2015)^{lxiii} or The Highland Council's Core Paths map^{lxiv}.

Within the larger of the parts of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area that are covered by the Cairngorms National Park, there is a hill with a summit of note, the *Fiona Càrn Glas-choire*, for which a change is suggested for Cairngorms National Park Planning Authority to take into account in the preparation of the Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan (see Table 18).

4.3.4 Emerging Local Development Plans

The Highland Council

The Highland Council states in its February 2026 Development Plans Newsletter^{lxv} that the Highland Local Development Plan is due to be adopted in 2029-2030. The Highland Council's Local Place Plan registration deadline, in relation to the preparation of the new Local Development Plan, has been extended, and Local Place Plans registered by end-September 2026 will be taken into account in the Highland Local Development Plan preparation from the outset^{lxvi}.

The Highland Council ran a '[Call for Development Sites](#)'^{lxvii} from 31/01/2025 to 02/05/2025, for landowners, developers, and others to suggest a range of sites they wish the Council to consider for the Highland Local Development Plan. The Highland Council will decide in 2027 what sites it proposes to include in the HLDP. The Proposed HLDP will then be subject to a statutory public consultation and objection process in 2027-2028.

No suggested sites were submitted for Strathdearn during the Highland Local Development Plan 'Call for Development Sites' that closed on 02/05/2025, as shown by [The Highland Council's HLDP Suggested Sites map](#)^{lxviii}. Confirmation has been obtained from The Highland Council Development Plans Team that existing IMFLDP2 (2024) Development Allocations (see Map 4) will be included in the Council's consideration of sites as part of its preparations for the Highland Local Development Plan.

The Highland Council will be holding a Call for Ideas^{lxix} to inform the preparation of the Highland Local Development Plan, with details to be announced on www.highland.gov.uk/hldp at a future date.

Cairngorms National Park

The Cairngorms National Park states in its November 2025 Development Plans Scheme^{lxx} that it has reached the point at which new registered Local Place Plans cannot be taken into account by the Cairngorms National Park Planning Authority in preparing its new Local Development Plan, but that any Local Place Plans registered in the future may still be taken into account in future planning decisions or in the preparation of a future Local Development Plan.

According to the National Planning Framework 4 – Delivery Programme V4 (January 2026), the Cairngorms National Park anticipates adoption of its new Local Development Plan before May 2028^{lxxi}.

4.4 Locality Plans and other policy-related information

Locality Plans

At present, there is no formal Locality Plan published by the Inverness Community Partnership or the Badenoch and Strathspey Community Partnership for the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area. There is a Draft Inverness Locality Plan (2024)^{lxxii}, prepared by the Inverness Community Partnership, to which the Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation has accordingly had regard.

The Draft Inverness Locality Plan (2024) makes no specific reference to the Strathdearn area or any of its constituent areas (Moy, Tomatin, Dalarossie). However, as Strathdearn is located in the Inverness Community Partnership area, the Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation had regard to the four *Outcomes* of the Draft Inverness Locality Plan, as shown below with their associated Key Objectives:

- *Poverty Reduction* – Key Objective: More People in Inverness will live a life free from the experience of Poverty
- *Mental Health and Wellbeing* – Key Objective: People in Inverness City and Area will benefit from good mental health and wellbeing
- *Access to Services* – Key Objective: People in Inverness City and Area will experience fewer barriers to accessing local services.
- *Community Safety and Resilience* – Key Objective: People in Inverness City and Area will benefit from living in strong, safer and more resilient communities.

Other policy-related information

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation had regard to the following policy-related information:

[Revised Highland Outcome Improvement Plan 2024-2027](#)^{lxxiii}

This overarching plan for the Highland Community Planning Partnership covers both The Highland Development Plans area and the Cairngorms National Park. The Highland Outcome Improvement Plan (HOIP) vision, to maximise opportunities and tackle inequality, is delivered through three strategic priorities (People, Place, Prosperity), and includes addressing challenges of housing, transport, and childcare, which the HOIP states are the key barriers to sustaining local communities.

[Highland Delivery Programme](#)^{lxxiv}

This delivery programme includes information for identifying, monitoring and implementing actions for delivering growth in the Main Settlements defined in IMFLDP2 (2024), which includes Tomatin.

[Community Asset Transfer](#)^{lxxv}

The Highland Council [properties map](#)^{lxxvi} shows assets for which communities may submit a request for ownership, leasing, management, or use under community asset transfer. The Highland Council-owned community assets referred to in this Local Place Plan are: Tomatin War Memorial, Moy cemetery, Dalarossie cemetery, and Tomatin recycling point. Strathdearn Primary School is on the Council's properties map; however, Strathdearn Primary School is currently owned by a Private Partnership Programme (PPP) company and is due to revert to Highland Council ownership in 2027.

[Local Living Mapping](#)^{lxxvii}

The Highland Council's Local Living Tool was created to show how well places in Highland meet the local living principles contained in NPF4 *Policy 15: Local Living and 20 minute neighbourhoods*.

The Council's Local Living Tool plots the location of services such as shops, parks, leisure facilities, and learning facilities, and shows how accessible these services are within a 10 minute (800 metre) walk distance. Information on the Local Living Tool is available at: www.highland.gov.uk/localliving and the score and colour ratings produced by the Local Living Tool are shown in Figure 3.

The Highland Council's Local Living Walkability results for Strathdearn, which is focused on Tomatin, indicate a central spine with a 'High Level of Walkable Services', with a small adjacent area with 'Some Walkable Services'. Over half of the Local Living mapped area for Tomatin is classed as having 'Few Walkable Services'. For full results of The Highland Council's Local Living Walkability for Tomatin, see Map 5, located beside the current IMFLDP2 Development Allocations in Tomatin (see Map 4).

[Self-build register](#)^{lxxix}

The Highland Council's register of parties expressing an interest in acquiring self-build land in The Highland Council development plans area was sought from the Council, as this may help indicate the level of interest in self-build housing in the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area. It is understood that some interest has been expressed in self-build within the Strathdearn Community Council area. Information from The Highland Council's self-build register is expected to be made accessible in due course via the Council's self-build webpage: www.highland.gov.uk/selfbuild.

[Development Guidance](#)^{lxxx}

Regard was had to Development Guidance published by The Highland Council, including the following Supplementary Guidance: [Green Networks Guidance](#)^{lxxxi} and [Physical Constraints Guidance](#)^{lxxxii}.

[Highland Play Sufficiency Assessment](#)^{lxxxiii}

Regard was had to The Highland Council Council's analysis of the Play Park at Old Mill Road, Tomatin in the Council's [play sufficiency map](#)^{lxxxiv} and [Play Sufficiency Assessment](#)^{lxxxv}.

[Core Paths interactive map](#)^{lxxxvi}

Regard was had to The Highland Council's Core Paths interactive map, which shows the Core Paths in The Highland Council development plans area and the Cairngorms National Park. The Core Paths Plan for both are being updated, as follows:

- Following a public call in 2019, The Highland Council is currently updating the Core Paths Plan for the Inner Moray Firth area^{lxxxvii}.
- Following informal consultation in 2025, the Cairngorms National Park is reviewing the Core Paths Plan^{lxxxviii}.

[Land Reform \(Scotland\) Act 2025](#)^{lxxxix}

Due to the Local Place Plan area featuring several large landholdings, the Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparation had regard to the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2025 (see Chapter 12 for more details).

Emerging policy and policy-related information

The following emerging policy-related information is likely to be of interest to the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area:

Proposed Short Term Let Control Area

The Highland Council's Proposed *Highland Rural* Short Term Let Control Area (STLCA) includes the southern rural portion of Ward 19 Inverness South, which includes most of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area.

The consultation for the proposed Highland Rural STLCA closed on 23/06/2026. Details about the consultation and the analysis of the survey responses will be available from the Council's STLCA webpage: www.highland.gov.uk/short-term-lets/short-term-let-control-areas

Dark Skies planning policy

Councillors at The Highland Council agreed on 28/05/2026 to take forward a new planning policy aimed at reducing light pollution in Highland. The Highland Council Press Release^{xc} gives an overview of the policy and associated timings, while more detailed information is available in the Council's Economy and Infrastructure Committee Report, Item 11. 5 Community engagement

5.1 Local Place Plan community engagement

5.1.1 National Standards for Community Engagement

The Strathdearn Local Place Plan community engagement was conducted with regard to the seven National Standards for Community Engagement^{xcii}: Impact, Communication, Methods, Working Together, Planning, Support, and Inclusion, as described in Figure 4.

5.1.2 Local Place Plan awareness raising

From November to December 2025, awareness raising activities were carried out to:

- 1 Introduce the Strathdearn Community Council's intention to prepare a Local Place Plan.
- 2 Explain the differences and similarities between the previous community-led plan – Strathdearn Community Action Plan 2022-2027 – and a place-based Local Place Plan.
- 3 Explain the Local Place Plan preparation process, and the future steps planned by Strathdearn Community Council, including the key opportunities for the community to have their say.
- 4 Establish the communication channels relating to the preparation of the new community plan.

The Local Place Plan awareness raising activities involved:

- Local Place Plan drop-in sessions were held at The Strathdearn hall on 22/11/2025 and 25/11/2025 to offer the opportunity for the community to view Local Place Plan related information, including policy documents and registered Local Place Plans and to ask questions. The sessions were hosted for the duration (four-hours each), and attracted 10 attendees on 22/11/2025, and 19 attendees on 25/11/2025, which included P7 pupils and staff from the local Strathdearn Primary School.
- A Local Place Plan community engagement survey was open from 03/11/2025 to 28/11/2025, to ask the community's preferred days/ times for taking part in community engagement activities.
- A Local Place Plan Pop-Up was held at the Winter Market at The Strathdearn hall on 06/12/2025, to share information about the Strathdearn Local Place Plan preparations, including details of the community engagement activities planned for 2026. The Pop-Up was hosted for the duration of the market (four hours) and attracted 20 attendees from the local community and wider area.

5.1.3 Local Place Plan community engagement

From February to April 2026, community engagement activities were carried out to find out the aims and aspirations of the Strathdearn community for their local place, as outlined below. A summary of the community engagement activities' participation and outputs is shown in Table 4.

Activities in February 2026

Survey for residents, businesses, landowners

Three surveys, designed to capture the aims and aspirations of Strathdearn residents (aged 12 and over), businesses operating in the Strathdearn area, and local landowners (resident and non-resident in Strathdearn), were launched on 04/02/2026 and were open for responses until 13/03/2026. The surveys were available online using MS Forms, in paper copy, and as a Word fillable form.

Drop-in sessions

Six drop-in sessions were held during February at The Strathdearn hall to enable the community to view information about the Strathdearn area and about the Local Place Plan process, ask questions, and make comments both in written form and verbally. The drop-in sessions included four weekdays, and two weekend days, over the following dates: 10/02/2026, 12/02/2026, 21/02/2026, 22/02/2026, 23/02/2026, and 25/02/2026. In addition to the school visit (see below), there was a total of 17 attendees at the drop-in sessions, comprising 14 attendees from IV13 and three from outwith IV13.

Strathdearn Primary School P1-P7 pupils drop-in session visit

The P1-P7 pupils from the local primary school visited the Local Place Plan drop-in session at The Strathdearn hall on 25/02/2025, where they took part in a drawing activity on the theme of 'My future Strathdearn'. The pupils were also invited to write comments on sticky notes for the comment boards, which asked the children to comment on what they liked, what they did not like, what they wanted to see staying the same, and what they wanted to see changed in Strathdearn.

Activities in March-April 2026

Focus groups with businesses operating in Strathdearn and local landowners

Facilitated, in-person focus groups for businesses operating in the Strathdearn area, and for landowners (resident and non-resident in Strathdearn) took place at The Strathdearn on 31/03/2026 and 01/04/2026 respectively, with specific agendas for each focus group to guide the sessions. Five people attended both sessions, so out of the total of 20 attendees, there were 15 unique attendees.

Consultation with community groups

Local community groups were invited to share their aims and aspirations for their local place on behalf of their group members. Group comments were submitted by email, in person, and by phone.

Strathdearn Primary School in-school drawing activities for Nursery and P1-P7 pupils

The pupils from the local primary school took part in two drawing activities kindly led in-school by the teaching staff. Both activities were all-age, to include nursery and primary pupils. One drawing activity asked the children to create a design on a sheet of paper on the theme of a 'A place in my local place', while the other drawing activity invited the children to colour in bubble letters spelling 'Local Place Plan' on the theme of 'What I love about my local place'.

Communicating the community engagement activities

The Local Place Plan community engagement activities were communicated via the following means to maximise awareness of the plan in preparation:

- Strathdearn website
- Local Place Plan webpage (hosted on the Strathdearn website)
- Strathdearn Facebook page
- Notice boards in Tomatin and Moy
- Weekly 'What's On' calendar at The Strathdearn hall
- Strathdearn News, quarterly community newsletter, delivered by hand to around 330 households
- The Highland Council fortnightly community briefing
- Monthly Strathdearn Community Council meetings
- Two-monthly Strathdearn Community Developments meetings
- Direct messaging, comprising emails, with some hand delivered messages as required.

5.1.4 Results of the Local Place Plan community engagement activities

The community engagement activities carried out for the Local Place Plan preparation revealed some collective strong opinion, coupled with some mixed opinion.

An overview of aspects that are **appreciated** by the Strathdearn community, and an indication of the community's future **aspirations** are as follows, with further explanatory information provided below.

Appreciated – The aspects of the local area appreciated by the community include:

- **Community spirit:** People, events, interaction between local groups, Facebook page
- **Outdoor activity:** Walking routes, community-owned woods, MUGA, play parks
- **Indoor activity:** Strathdearn Hub – great events, flexibility and willingness of staff, a focal point for the community to gather
- **Environment:** Natural beauty of the rural area (strath, mountains, and loch), presence of a Seasonal Ranger at Loch Moy
- **Built heritage:** Views towards the Findhorn viaduct from the Hub, views of the listed bridges
- **Location:** Remote but not too remote, well placed for visitors and businesses

Aspirations – The aspirations of the community for their local area include:

- **Care:** Childcare for 1-3 years and afterschool, adult care provision, handy person
- **Transport:** Community transport, public transport, carpark and bike rack at the A9 bus stop, increased carparking, snowploughing/gritting on the glen road, re-open train station
- **Housing:** Accessible housing for older residents, rented affordable housing, self-build plots
- **Outdoor activities:** Walking routes, mountain bike trail, improved skate park, toddler pump track, pram-friendly loop at Hazelbank Community Wood, Playgroup summer play provision at Hazelbank Community Wood, Playgroup outside play area at the Hub, outdoor football/shinty pitch, outdoor space for informal socialising and organised community events
- **Environment:** Protect against wind farms, Moy Ranger, wildfire plan, peatland restoration
- **Communications:** Mobile phone connectivity, superfast fibre broadband
- **Business:** Small business units, short-term accommodation for temporary staff
- **Community benefit:** Electricity discount, community-owned renewables, carbon finance

Care in the community: There is a strong wish for the provision of adult care in the home, with a total of 82% of the Local Place Plan Community survey respondents Strongly Agreeing or Agreeing with the need in the community. There is also a wish for housing that is suitable for older residents so they can stay in the area. Childcare for children aged from one-year of age to primary aged was expressed in terms of its importance in helping local residents to balance work responsibilities and to stay in the local area.

Natural beauty: There was strong sentiment that Strathdearn has a natural beauty that is important to the local community and which needs to be protected against over-industrialisation. The strath, the hills and woodland around Tomatin (especially Hazelbank Community Wood and Distillery Wood), and Loch Moy are appreciated for their rural setting, peace, wildlife, walking opportunities, and at night, for their dark skies. The view from The Strathdearn Hub across the River Findhorn with the

bridges and Corrybrough Hill is considered special. The views around the upper part of the Strath, Loch Moy, and The Streens are also considered to be special views in the local area. The local environment is valued by the residents and by the businesses who provide tourism-related services, who said that it is the natural beauty of the rural area that draws customers to the area and fear was expressed in relation to what impact the wind turbines may have on visitor numbers.

Hazelbank Community Wood: Great enthusiasm was expressed for Hazelbank Community Wood. It is clear, particularly from the primary school children, that the purchase of community woodland, and the effort being put into its sustainable and sensitive development, is greatly appreciated, and has resulted in a much-treasured, community-owned asset. In addition to leisure and recreation use, the community woodland is used for teaching and learning opportunities, where pupils from Strathdearn Primary School enjoy engaging in meaningful and valuable outdoor learning and forest schools, which supports their overall school experience and supports positive health and wellbeing.

Play and sport: The two play areas in Tomatin area are appreciated and enjoyed, and desire was expressed for a Playgroup outdoor play area at The Strathdearn. There is a strong desire for a downhill mountain bike trail. A pump track, toddler pump track, and a safe place to learn to ride a bike were also mentioned. There is an aspiration for an outdoor sports pitch for football/shinty and an outdoor socialising area. The 9pm closing time of the covered sports pitch was mentioned as a negative factor relating to its availability for use. A skate park development is desired.

Transport: The lack of public transport in the local area was raised in a lot of responses. Many called for a better bus service, with 27 out of the 33 community responses Strongly Agreeing or Agreeing that better/more frequent public transport was needed between Strathdearn and Inverness. Some of the responses included praise for the recently improved public bus service that come into effect with the introduction of the Ember E9 service to the local area. However, concerns were voiced over the distance from the bus turning circle by the A9 junction at Tomatin north to Tomatin village centre and how this is a potential barrier to older and infirm community members for accessing bus services.

Some responses called for community transport, including a community bus to get to health appointments, and being transported between Tomatin village centre and the bus stop by the A9 junction. Taxi vouchers were suggested as a potential alternative to community-owned transport, with the added benefit of providing local employment for someone providing taxi services.

There is a continued desire to re-open Tomatin railway station, with a total of 70% of the Local Place Plan Community survey responses Strongly Agreeing or Agreeing that the station should be re-opened. This aspiration has featured in community plans for Strathdearn for the past twenty years. Issues relating to snowploughing and gritting on roads, and on active travel routes was highlighted, and a lack of pupil transport from the distillery housing to the school and/or village shop was raised.

Speed limits on local roads: There was mixed opinion regarding the recent introduction of 20mph speed limits in Tomatin. Some respondents called for the removal of the 20mph speed limit and the reinstatement of the previous 30mph speed limit. Several suggested further speed reductions: to the north and south of Tomatin village, by the primary school, the top end of Old Mill Road, Station Road, between Porters Lodge and Tomatin village, near Drumbain junction, Moy, and on the glen road.

Street lighting: There was mixed opinion regarding street lighting, with dark skies valued by residents and tourist accommodation providers. There was some favour for street lighting, with low level bollards suggested for residential areas and active travel routes, such as Station Road. Lighting was also requested near the school, at the recycling point, and at the entrances to Tomatin village.

Reactive lighting was put forward as an alternative, with other responses calling for streetlights to go off at night. Lighting outwith the village was expressed as not being in keeping with the rural area.

Development: There is a mixed opinion about development in the area, with some responses in favour of local development and some against. The community aspiration for development centres around housing (accessible and affordable), carparking, road and footpath improvements, development to support local business (e.g. the creation of small business units), and the creation of outdoor sport and leisure facilities, e.g. bike trail, sports pitch, outdoor gathering space. There was a general agreement regarding the areas that needed to be protected from development, which included the hills around the village of Tomatin, near the woodland (including Hazelbank Community Wood and Distillery Wood), the area south of the Strathdearn Hub and along the glen road, any place near the River Findhorn and up in the hills, the Strath, and the Monadhliath Mountains. Several responses expressed that development in Strathdearn should be concentrated around Tomatin.

Carparking: A need for more hall and café carparking was expressed to support local events without blocking parking in neighbouring roads. The creation of formal car parking spaces in the vicinity of the recycling point in Tomatin was put forward as a suggestion in several responses. A need was expressed for parking at the bus turning circle by the A9 junction at Tomatin north, with suggestions that this parking area should include a bike rack and potentially also electric vehicle and bike recharging points. A need for carparking was also expressed at the entrance to Lynebeg, where the space for parking has become limited as a result of the A9 dualling works.

Burial ground: During the Local Place Plan awareness raising activities, concerns were raised that the burial grounds at Moy and Dalarossie might be nearing capacity. The Local Place Plan surveys sought opinion on the need for additional burial space, with one response suggesting that Drumbain Hill might be a location to consider for a future burial area (noting that there is an ancient burial ground on the knoll at Drumbain). The Local Place Plan Community survey showed that a total of 30% of respondents Strongly Agreed or Agreed that more burial space was required, while 67% of respondents were neutral. In April 2026, The Highland Council Environmental Health and Bereavement Services confirmed that the projected prepared capacity at these burial grounds is 19.9 years at Dalarossie and at least 20-years at Moy. The development of additional burial ground has therefore not been included in this five-year plan for the Strathdearn community.

Recycling facilities: The responses indicated that the community is generally happy with the current location of the recycling facilities in Tomatin, which is on Shop Brae near the waste treatment works. Some responses asked for the addition of battery recycling, better signposting for visitors to find the recycling point, more regular emptying of the facility, and street lighting in the area. Some responses mentioned that a green waste recycling point would be useful, with Station Yard and Hazelbank Community Wood suggested as a location. The Strathdearn Hub was mentioned both as an area where there could be recycling, but also as an area where there should not be recycling.

Land for development: The Local Place Plan community engagement did not result in identifying any new sites of land in Strathdearn for development by the community. Acquiring land is an ongoing challenge and may be a limiting factor in future development, such as creating accessible and additional affordable homes, and long-desired outdoor facilities, such as a bike trail.

One local landowner, via the Landowner Survey, expressed a willingness to occasionally open up a field in Tomatin for use by the community for overflow parking and/or perhaps for some other temporary activity, which is a kind offer that is welcomed and appreciated by the community.

Another landowner, Tomatin Estate, the owner of IMFLDP2 Development Allocation TM02, indicated an interest, following the Landowner Focus Group, in developing proposals with the community for a housing proposal for TM02, which could include an active travel route from Tomatin village centre to the Park and Ride carpark by the A9 junction at Tomatin north. There is currently no associated proposal to include in this Local Place Plan. While noting that any such development would not be community-led, the community has reflected the potential for any such future development on TM02 by including suggested changes to the local development plan in Chapter 11 (see C21, C35, and C39).

Wild camping: There was mixed opinion regarding overnight stays by campervans in the Strathdearn area, with some observing anti-social behaviour, such as tipping waste into laybys, while others reported no issue. The Tomatin recycling point was mentioned several times in relation to campervan parking occurring in that area. There was not a strong opinion in favour of creating a formal campervan area with booking and PIN code entry.

Wind farm development: There was general view that the local area had experienced a large degree of development through the installation of wind farms and associated infrastructure, and a desire was expressed from all sectors and ages of the community for no more wind farms in the Strathdearn area. Comments referred to wind farm development's potential to destroy the landscape and the draw of this much-loved area, and called for protection of the Strath, as there is a fear that turbines may end up being visible on every horizon. The concern over the impact on the landscape also links to concerns over the impact on tourism for business purposes. Concerns were expressed about over-industrialisation of the local area, with many comments referring to turbines now being taller and having lights. Many responses expressed interest in discounted electricity through a Local Energy Discount Scheme (LEDS). Some interest was expressed in windfarm community ownership, with possible interest in a community-owned renewable energy project, but LEDS appears to be the most popular option. Responding to applications for wind development around the Strathdearn area is an ongoing and time-consuming task for the local community.

5.2 Previous community plans

Four community plans have previously been prepared for the Strathdearn area, three of which carried out an appraisal of the Strathdearn community as a whole and one, which focused specifically on the Moy community (see Table 5).

Strathdearn community appraisal

The 2006 PRIN study's appraisal of the Strathdearn area highlighted areas for improvement that were considered key by the community for sustaining their local area – housing, transport, village facilities, and youth/sports facilities – and which included interest in re-opening Tomatin railway station.

Strathdearn Community Planning Study

The purpose of the 2011 CADISPA study was to identify and clarify issues of concern to the people living in the Strathdearn community, from which the community was required to develop their own action agenda. As part of CADISPA's recommendations, they recommended that the Strathdearn community develop a five-year action plan and set up a Local Development Trust to take forward the community's priorities; this led to the establishment of Strathdearn Community Developments (see Chapter 6). The 2011 CADISPA recommendations led to the following action within Strathdearn:

- Development and construction of a community-owned hall, café, and shop in Tomatin
- Installation of superfast fibre broadband to most households in Strathdearn
- Expansion of local path networks in Tomatin and Moy

- Establishment of Strathdearn Carers (a community care team serving older/infirm residents)
- Construction of a new children's play area
- Development of a new community website
- Purchase of e-bikes and installation of electric chargers and maintenance shed
- Creation of small works programme to improve the physical appearance of the community

The 2011 CADISPA study originally planned to cover the period from 2011-2016 but was extended to 10-years as many actions were still ongoing at the end of the five-year period – the development of affordable housing, development of after-school childcare services, and improvements to local walking and cycling routes. Re-opening the Tomatin railway station and mobile communications were also among the issues highlighted by the 2011 CADISPA study.

Moy Wind Farm community benefit fund - The preferences of Local People

The 2016 Moy CADISPA study conducted a needs survey of the residents of Moy, to help allow the Community Benefit funds generated from the Moy Wind Farm to be distributed in a way that was evidence-based, transparent, and fair. The Moy CADISPA study did not seek to prioritise its recommendations, but instead, it set out recommendations in response to the community's needs and wishes, for investigation and action as decided by the Moy community.

The recommendations included: broadband upgrade, community transport scheme, community improvement and maintenance plan, Moy community hub, and future proofing measures including energy efficiency measures for Moy households, extension to the then current Strathdearn Home Carer Service and installation of a defibrillator.

Strathdearn Community Action Plan

The Strathdearn Community Action Plan 2022-2027 is the most recent community plan for the Strathdearn area; its preparation was linked to discovering what legacy the community would like to see from the windfarms for the Strathdearn area.

The Strathdearn CAP identified main priorities for the local community grouped under seven themes:

- Children and young people
- Community transport
- Affordable housing
- Health and well-being
- Safety and the environment
- Support for local business development
- Moy-based priorities

The Strathdearn CAP reflected the community's ongoing interest in re-opening Tomatin railway station.

While the Strathdearn CAP was being prepared, the community were still progressing recommendations from the 2011 CADISPA study relating to affordable housing, after-school childcare services, and local walking and cycling routes.

5.3 Comparison of current and previous community engagement

The Strathdearn community has progressed many actions over the past two-decades, guided by the needs, wants, and concerns that have been raised since publishing its first community plan in 2006.

Over this time, while some actions have been completed to the delight of the community (e.g. the purchase of Hazelbank Community Wood), some issues of concern have remained a constant, either through not being met (e.g. re-opening Tomatin railway station), being met but then ceasing (e.g. Strathdearn Carers was established in mid-2015 but had to be handed back to the NHS due to a lack of clients, and difficulties in recruiting and retaining staff), or being met but continuing to be a community aspiration (e.g. affordable housing has been developed but there is demand for more).

A comparison of the four community plans that have been carried out for the Strathdearn area (see Table 6) gives an overview of the aims and aspirations of the Strathdearn community over time.

Time allowed for representations

On 13/05/2026, a Local Place Plan Information Notice, which included a hyperlink to the webpage where the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan and feedback form were published, was emailed to the Councillors and Community Councils stated above.

The closing date for representations was 12/06/2026, which allowed the Councillors and Community Councils 30-days to make comments on the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan, which met and exceeded the minimum 28-day requirement for statutory Local Place Plan consultation.

Community invitation to the statutory consultation

Strathdearn Community Council also invited comments on the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan from anyone resident within or outwith the IV13 postal district.

The consultation period and the methods available for the submission of comments were advertised on the Strathdearn Local Place Plan webpage (<https://strathdearn.org/local-place-plan/>), in the Strathdearn News community newsletter, on the Strathdearn community social media, and on public notice boards within the Strathdearn area.

A Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan static display was available in the foyer of The Strathdearn hall for the duration of the consultation period. Printed copies of the Proposed Local Place Plan and map extracts from the Proposed Local Place Plan were available to view at the static display. Printed copies of the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan were provided to local community groups and

local community organisations. Feedback on the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan was invited via online forms or via paper forms submitted in a comments box at the static display.

The Strathdearn Primary School P1-P7 pupils were invited to feedback on the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan during an interactive, in-person session at the static Local Place Plan display at The Strathdearn hall on 14/05/2026.

Responses to the statutory consultation

The responses to the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan statutory consultation were on the whole favourable and supportive of the content of the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan, with positive responses received from the Strathdearn Primary School P1-P7 pupils, various Councillors, and from members of the public from within and outwith the IV13 postal district.

The comments received on the Proposed Strathdearn Local Place Plan prompted minor updates and clarifications to the Strathdearn Local Place Plan, including the addition of a proposal to maintain the walkway and benches on Birch Walk in Moy, and the addition of a community action to explore the feasibility of hosting an InPost Locker at The Strathdearn hall.

6 Currently in place and ongoing

6.1 Our Community

Strathdearn has well-established, volunteer-led statutory, charitable, and community organisations that operate for the benefit of the community (see Table 7 and Table 8). These community organisations facilitate many of the services and activities available to the residents of Strathdearn, as shown in Table 9.

Public realm and amenity ▪ Welcoming – There are clear and friendly signs welcoming visitors to Moy and Tomatin, flowerpots and carved wooden benches in Moy and Tomatin. Work is currently underway to carry out some repairs to the carved wooden benches in Moy. ▪ Verge maintenance – The community carries out verge maintenance in Tomatin and Moy. For information, The Highland Council has a Verge Maintenance Manual for Roads in Rural Areas^c. ▪ Winter preparedness – This is a regular feature of life in Strathdearn. The Highland Council provides grit bins in Tomatin. The Moy Sub-Committee arranges grit supplies its local community. For information, The Highland Council's gritting route for Tomatin can be seen in Map 8. ▪ Snow clearing – Community-focussed snow clearing using community-owned equipment (complements The Highland Council's snow clearing). ▪ Local contractors – The community aims to appoint local contractors to community contracts, e.g. snow clearing, and path and verge maintenance. Local businesses ▪ Support to community-owned café – The community supports the community-owned café by using it for catering at The Strathdearn hall for events and community activities, e.g. the soup and other food provided at The Strathdearn Snug. ▪ Local employer – SCD employs residents in the running of The Strathdearn Hub, for project management, and to support community organisations. ▪ Tourism – Local attractions include Tomatin Distillery, the community-owned café, Moy Country Fair, bird watching, fishing, walking, and cycling. ▪ Moy Country Fair – This annual two-day fair is a major event in the local area, and in the Highlands, and is supported by the SCCT^{ci} ▪ Accommodation – Several businesses in the local area provide tourist accommodation. Childcare ▪ Afterschool provision – As of the 2025/26 academic year, Strathdearn Primary School provides term-time afterschool care on Wednesday afternoons. ▪ Afterschool pilot – A one-year pilot offering daily weekday afterschool care at Strathdearn Primary School is starting from the 2026/27 academic year. ▪ Registered Childminders – There are currently no childminders registered with the Scottish Childminding Association^{cii} in Strathdearn.

Community services ▪ Post Office – There is a regular weekly service in the foyer of The Strathdearn hall in Tomatin, on Wednesdays. ▪ Church services – Church of Scotland services are held regularly at The Strathdearn hall in Tomatin. Free Presbyterian Church of Scotland services are held one in three weeks in their church at Morile in Tomatin. Four church services a year are held at Dalarossie Church, to celebrate the seasons, by the kind arrangement of the new custodians of Dalarossie Church^{ciii}. ▪ Mobile library – The Dingwall and Moray Firth Mobile Library service stops on a regular basis at Tomatin, Lynebeg, and Moy^{civ}. ▪ Prescriptions – Medical prescriptions can be delivered directly to the home in the Strathdearn area by Milton of Leys Pharmacy on Mondays and Thursdays and can also be delivered on other days if there is an urgent requirement^{cv}. Community transport ▪ Where2Today – This is a registered charity (SC029556) that provides transport services to Badenoch and Strathspey, and Tomatin via an accessible bus service and by trained volunteer drivers' own cars. 6.2 Our Places

The community places in Strathdearn includes land and buildings owned by the community, land and buildings owned by the Council, and land owned by other landowners that is used by the community in a variety of ways (see Table 10).

Community-owned ▪ Strathdearn Hub – This area of land in Tomatin contains the community-owned hall (opened 2019), café, and shop, and includes publicly-accessible toilets registered under The Highland Council’s Comfort Scheme^{cvi}. The area features a multi-use games area (MUGA) with a covered, flood-lit outdoor 505m² synthetic pitch that is suitable for tennis and junior football/shinty matches, and is open from 9am to 9pm, and a toddler play area. ▪ Hazelbank Community Wood – Land comprising 21.6 hectares of woodland in Tomatin was bought by the community in 2025, thanks to an award from the Scottish Land Fund. Hazelbank Community Wood has been formed from two areas of woodland known as Hazelbank and Neacrath Strip, and is being managed by a community-employed Woodland Coordinator (see Chapter 6.3 for more details). The community wood is being used for leisure and school-related activities. There are concerns over increasing incidents of dog waste in the community wood not being picked up by dog owners. ▪ Affordable housing – The land known as Development Allocation TM01 in IMFLDP2 (see Map 4) was gifted to the community by Tomatin Estate in 2021^{cvi}. The site was developed by the community and the area, now known as Viaduct View, holds six community-owned affordable houses that were completed in 2026. Due to technical issues, the site delivered six houses, rather than the expected 12 houses and two self-build plots. The rental of the housing at Viaduct View is being managed for the community by the Communities Housing Trust (CHT). The CHT received 42 applications for rental at Viaduct View, during the application period in early 2026, with the houses then allocated according to agreed community criteria. ▪ Self-build plots – TM01 was due to provide two self-build plots; however, this was not possible, due to technical issues on site. There are currently no community-owned self-build plots in the Strathdearn area. It is understood that some interest has been expressed in self-build within the Strathdearn Community Council area. Information from The Highland Council’s self-build register is expected to be made accessible in due course via the Council’s self-build webpage: www.highland.gov.uk/selfbuild. Council-owned ▪ Tomatin War Memorial (Site code: HC 02471A; Structure code: HC 02471B) is under Council-ownership but is listed as a Community Asset. The memorial is accessed directly from the C1121, via steps and across an open field. There is no seating at the memorial. Note: This war memorial is called ‘Tomatin War Memorial’ by The Highland Council but is called the ‘Tomatin/Strathdearn War Memorial’ by War Memorials Online^{cvi}.

▪ Cemeteries – Moy cemetery (Site code: HC 02431A) and Dalarossie cemetery (Site code: HC 02413A) are Council-owned burial grounds but are listed as Community Assets. The Highland Council’s Environmental Health and Bereavement Service confirmed in April 2026, that the projected prepared capacity at these burial grounds is 19.9 years at Dalarossie and at least 20-years at Moy. ▪ Recycling point – The Highland Council-provided recycling point (Code: HC 06712) is located near the sewage works in Tomatin (see Map 10). The area of land immediately adjacent to the recycling point is used by the community as overflow carparking.		
Other ownership ▪ Strathdearn Primary School – Strathdearn Primary School is listed as a Community Asset, Business Unit Ref HC 05973, on the Highland Council Properties Map^{cxix}. The school was opened in 2002 and is nearing the end of its 25-year Public Private Partnership (PPP1)^{cx}. The planning consent for the school was granted on 04/01/2001 under application reference 00/00970/FULIN^{cxii}. Strathdearn Primary School is sometimes used by the local community to hold events. ▪ Play Park and Skate Park – The play area at Old Mill Road features community-owned equipment and a skate park on land leased by the community from Tomatin Estate for 20-years, starting from 05/07/2021. Planning consent for play park use at this location was granted by The Highland Council in 2019 (see planning application 19/03555/FUL^{cxiii}). The Play Park received a Highland Play Sufficiency Assessment^{cxiii} score of 20/56 with an average category score of 50%, which equates to a ‘High’ quality rating according to The Highland Council’s January 2026 Play Sufficiency Assessment report^{cxiv}. ▪ Mini meadows – Tomatin has three mini meadows, thanks to the effort of community volunteers, help from local schoolchildren and the kind loan of land from Tomatin Estate (two patches) and another local landowner (one patch). One mini meadow is registered on the Meadow Mosaic map^{cxv}. ▪ Distillery wood – This area of woodland is designated as Green Network in IMFLDP2 (see Map 4) and contains two designated Core Paths^{cxvi}. ▪ Moy forestry area – The Moy Sub-Committee is currently progressing a Moy Forestry Management Agreement with Forestry and Land Scotland.		

6.3 Our Environment

The environment in Strathdearn ranges from managed land (including farming and forestry), community-owned woodland, and green network, to remote landscape and wild land area in the Strath (see Table 11).

Land management ▪ Landowners – Land within the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area is managed largely by estates, farmers, and by Forestry and Land Scotland. ▪ Forestry/logging removal – Strathdearn Community Council engages with Forestry/logging removal companies to ensure that Timber Management Planning incorporates safe practices and does not disrupt or endanger community activities/lives. The Agreed Routes Map for Timber Transport are provided on an online map by the Timber Transport Forum^{cxvii}. ▪ Wildfire – Due to its geographical location and land conditions, the Strathdearn community is aware of the potential for wildfire in its vicinity^{cxviii}. Wildfire has been identified in the Strathdearn Resilience Plan as high risk and mitigation/response measures documented. Plans for community awareness-raising to complement the Strathdearn Resilience Plan are currently in progress. ▪ Seasonal Ranger – A part-time Seasonal Ranger^{cxix} has been commissioned by the community since 2021 through The Highland Council to patrol the forest area around Loch Moy on evenings and at weekends, when the area is most used, with a focus on public engagement and education. The appointment of a seasonal ranger to patrol elsewhere in Strathdearn may be a future consideration. Woodland ▪ Hazelbank Community Wood – The community wood was purchased in 2025 as a mixed amenity woodland to be managed for a variety of uses and with light touch development. A Woodland Management Plan will be prepared the Woodland Coordinator covering 5–10 years to 2031-2036. This will be based on the Feasibility and Business Plan submitted to the Scottish Land Fund as part of the community buyout process. ○ The Woodland Management Plan will include managing the non-native spruce plantation, supporting natural regeneration from it, and selective thinning in the wider woodland. More native broadleaf species will be introduced over time to improve resilience and biodiversity. ○ Any changes within the woodland will be designed with community benefit, wildlife, neighbouring land, and nearby residential areas in mind. Some forestry work will result in temporary path closures and restricted areas during timber operations. ○ An upgrade to the smaller path loops is being considered, which could make them suitable for off-road prams.

○ Continuous Cover Forestry is being explored as a potential income stream, with managed harvesting forming part of the woodland's long-term lifecycle. ○ Part of the woodland within the area covered by Hazelbank Community Wood is identified as green network in IMFLDP2 (see Map 4). ▪ Distillery wood – The whole of this area of woodland is designated as green network in IMFLDP2 (see Map 4). ▪ Green network – Green network promotes greenspace linkages and ensures accessibility for both wildlife and people. In addition to Distillery Wood and Hazelbank Community Wood, Tomatin features many areas designated as green network, including to the east and south of the Hub buildings. ▪ Forestry area in Moy – The Moy Sub-Committee is currently progressing a Moy Forestry Management Agreement with Forestry and Land Scotland. Landscape ▪ Landscape Character Type – The Local Place Plan area lies within NatureScot Landscape Character Type 221 – Rolling Uplands - Inverness^{cxx} ▪ Monadhliath Mountains – The southern part of the Local Place Plan area lies within the Monadhliath Mountains. ▪ The Strath – The 22-mile-long Strath extends from the River Findhorn's headwater along the full length of the watershed and runs the full length of the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area through to Moy. ▪ Special Landscape Area – Drynachan, Lochindorb and Dava Moors Special Landscape Area (SLA 22)^{cxxi} in the north-east of the Local Place Plan area. ▪ Wild Land Area – Monadhliath Wild Land Area (WLA) 20 is located in the south-west part of the Local Place Plan area. NatureScot describes WLA 20 as a "a range of massive rounded hills and plateaux that are awe-inspiring in their simplicity, openness and immense scale, and offer panoramic views to distant mountain ranges"^{cxxii}. WLAs are identified as nationally important in Scottish Planning Policy but are not a statutory designation^{cxxiii}. Natural heritage ▪ River Findhorn – The headwaters of the River Findhorn, one of the longest rivers in Scotland are located in the south of the Local Place Plan area. ▪ Sites of Special Scientific Interest (see NatureScot Sitelink website^{cxxiv} and Assessment of Condition key ^{cxxv}) ○ Allt na Feithe Sheilich SSSI: Quaternary of Scotland – Favourable maintained. ○ Monadhliath SSSI: Black mountain moth (Glacies coracina) – Favourable maintained; Breeding bird assemblage – Favourable maintained; Blanket bog – Unfavourable, no change; Dotterel breeding – Unfavourable, no change; Upland assemblage – Favourable maintained; Vascular plant assemblage – Favourable declining. ○ Carn nan Tri-tighearnan SSSI: Blanket bog – Favourable recovered; Subalpine dry heath – Unfavourable, no change.

Windfarms ▪ Windfarm development – Strathdearn is an area that is currently under constant pressure from windfarm development, as shown on The Highland Council’s Major Energy Related Planning Applications map^{cxxviii}. ▪ The Strathdearn Windfarm Interim Advisory Group (SWIAG) – This community organisation was formed as a sub-group of Strathdearn Community Council to keep residents informed of proposed wind farm development in the local area, as shown on their webpage: https://strathdearn.org/wind-farms/ and to make representations to the Energy Consents Unit of the Scottish Government, as guided by community views. The results of a wind farm survey conducted by SWIAG in early-2025 that received 184 replies can be viewed on the Strathdearn.org website^{cxxix}. ▪ Community benefit – Strathdearn currently receives annual community benefit from four windfarms: Dunmaglass Wind Farm, Farr Wind Farm, Glen Kyllachy Wind Farm, and Moy Wind Farm. An upfront payment was taken from the Moy Wind Farm community benefit, thus reducing subsequent annual payments from Moy Wind Farm. The Strathdearn community is due to receive annual community benefit from Aberarder Wind Farm from 2028. The Strathdearn community previously received community benefit from Tom Na Clach Wind Farm as an upfront payment.				

6.4 Our Infrastructure

The Strathdearn area relies on a wide range of infrastructure, ranging from modern installation, high quality refurbishments, to original, historic structures.

Roads The A9 – The A9 single carriageway from Tomatin to Moy is currently being dualled. - Access to Tomatin is due to change as part of the dualling works, as the A9 junction at Tomatin South is closing to south-bound traffic and becoming a left off left on junction for north-bound traffic only. The A9 junction at Tomatin north has moved to a new location (see Map 11). - When the dualling works are complete, Strathdearn will have a new road system with signage that should reflect local needs and issues. - The A9 upgrade between Tomatin and Moy will include three new roadside art installations, for which the arrangements for their long-term maintenance and ongoing litter removal responsibilities will be of interest to the local community. B9154 – This is the road that runs through Moy, which is also known locally as the ‘old A9’. Currently, the road speed limit remains at 60mph despite it being part of National Cycle Route 7. Flooding remains an issue where the B9154 crosses under the Highland Mainline. C1121 – This is the Freeburn - Tomatin - Garbole Road, with the section running through Tomatin known locally as the ‘old A9’. The section of the C1121 road from the junction by the Findhorn Bridge in Tomatin to Coignashie, is known locally as the ‘glen road’. Old Mill Road – The adoption of part of Old Mill Road (U2840), in Tomatin, is currently being discussed between Strathdearn Community Council and The Highland Council, to enable a section of this road to be added to The Highland Council’s list of adopted roads, which would make it eligible for Council provided pot hole repairs and inclusion on the Council’s gritting route map (see Map 8). Station Road – Station Road (U2860) is not fully adopted by The Highland Council; the adopted stretch is located between grid references 8026 2910 and 7969 2934. The non-adopted section of Station Road often becomes potholed, which causes difficulty for car users and may cause difficulty for some forms of wheeled active travel. The local community has previously paid for work to be carried out on this road to fill the potholes. Station Road forms part of the community’s local paths network and is designated by The Highland Council as a ‘Safe Route to School’ from the north (Distillery) end all the way down to Tomatin Viaduct. Station Road is not part of the active travel network identified for Tomatin in IMFLDP2 (see Map 4).

Bridges ▪ Raigbeg Bridge – Strathdearn Community Council has requested that The Highland Council carry out an inspection of Raigbeg Bridge, in Tomatin, to gain an indication of any necessary repairs and is currently awaiting the outcome. ▪ Height restrictions – Strathdearn has two road bridges with height restrictions^{cxix}. Moybeg Bridge (Code: U28640010) has signed headroom of 3.7m, which will form part of the new junction as part of the A9 dualling, and Moy Railway Bridge (Code: B91540020) has signed headroom of 4.3m. ▪ Listed bridges – Strathdearn features several bridges, which are both functional and of historical interest: Aultnaslanach Viaduct, Findhorn Viaduct, Tomatin Railway Viaduct, and the Findhorn Bridge. Carparking ▪ Park and Ride carpark – A carparking area with bike rack is currently being developed at the A9 bus stop at Tomatin north. The land for this carpark was leased to the community in 2026 by Tomatin Estate for a period of three-years. ▪ Overflow carparking – The land next to the recycling point is used by the community as overflow carparking. The ownership of this land is unknown. The Highland Council Community Asset^{cxixi} map gives Tomatin Recycling Point as a point location with no indication of site area (see Map 10). Public transport ▪ Bus services – There has been a recent improvement to the public transport bus provision in Strathdearn. There are currently three bus services servicing the Strathdearn Local Place Plan area: The Highland Council (300), Stagecoach (37), and Ember (E9). ▪ Tomatin railway station – Tomatin station closed to passengers and goods traffic on 3 May 1965. Re-opening the station is regularly mentioned in Strathdearn’s community-led plans. One of IMFLDP2’s Placemaking Priorities for Tomatin is exploring the potential for re-opening the station (see Figure 1) and IMFLDP2 Development Allocation TM04 was included (see Map 4) to help facilitate any future plans regarding re-opening the station. ▪ Highland mainline – Sections of the Highland main line that pass through Strathdearn have seen recent investment. Network Rail invested £4.8m in embankment and drainage work at Slochd^{cxixii}, and £4.5m to refurbish the Findhorn viaduct, described as one of Britain’s finest railway viaducts^{cxixiii} Health and well-being ▪ Defibrillators – There are community-installed defibrillators in Tomatin and Moy. For the locations of the defibrillators, visit: www.defibfinder.uk/.

▪ Traffic calming – For road safety improvement, road narrowing was carried out on the C1121 at Tomatin Viaduct and Allt Neacrath Bridge, funded by The Highland Council Safer Routes to School Programme^{cxixiv}. ▪ Speed reduction – For road safety improvement, The Highland Council (Various Roads) (20 mph Speed Limit) Order 2024 came into effect on 18 June 2025 for six roads in Tomatin (see Map 7)^{cxixv} (note, where no extent is stated below, the 20mph speed limit applies to the full length of the road): ○ C1121: Freeburn - Tomatin - Garbole Road from a point 28m or thereby to the north of its junction with the U2860 Station Road extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 947m or thereby. ○ U2829: Tomatin - Balvraid Road, from its junction with the C1121 extending easterly for a distance of 16m or thereby (the road descending from the U2829 junction with the C1121 is known locally as Shop Brae). ○ U2860: Station Road, from its junction with the C1121 extending westerly for a distance of 24m or thereby. ○ U2840: Old Mill Road. ○ U2944: School Road. ○ U5708: Juniper Drive. ▪ Speed surveys – Surveys carried out in Tomatin in October 2022 and September 2023, to inform The Highland Council’s decisions on speed reduction, together with the March 2026 post-implementation survey can be viewed on the Council’s interactive map on the Tracsis Dashboard System^{cxixvi}.			
Paths ▪ Crooked Mile – Discussions are currently ongoing to confirm the ownership and location of the Crooked Mile, a stretch of road known locally as the ‘old-old A9’, which is popular with dog-walkers, to improve its use as a walkway (see Map 16). ▪ Birch Walk – This is a popular walk by Loch Moy through Forestry and Land Scotland woodland (see Map 16). Maintenance is required at intervals to keep the path clear and benches (four) accessible, which the local community has previously carried out in liaison with Forestry and Land Scotland. ▪ Core Paths – The Local Place Plan area has three Core Paths. Two in Tomatin: the 3.06km ‘Distillery Wood’ track (reference IN27.02) and the 1.9km ‘Allt Neacrath Loop’ earth path (reference IN27.03); and the 1.64km ‘National Cycle Route 7 by A9’ tar path (reference IN27.01) at Slochd Summit. ▪ Walkway on B9154 – This walkway alongside the B9154 through Moy is used for leisure walking and active travel purposes. The local community has carried out work at intervals to provide and maintain benches (two), and clearing and culverting works to keep the walkway accessible (see Map 16).			

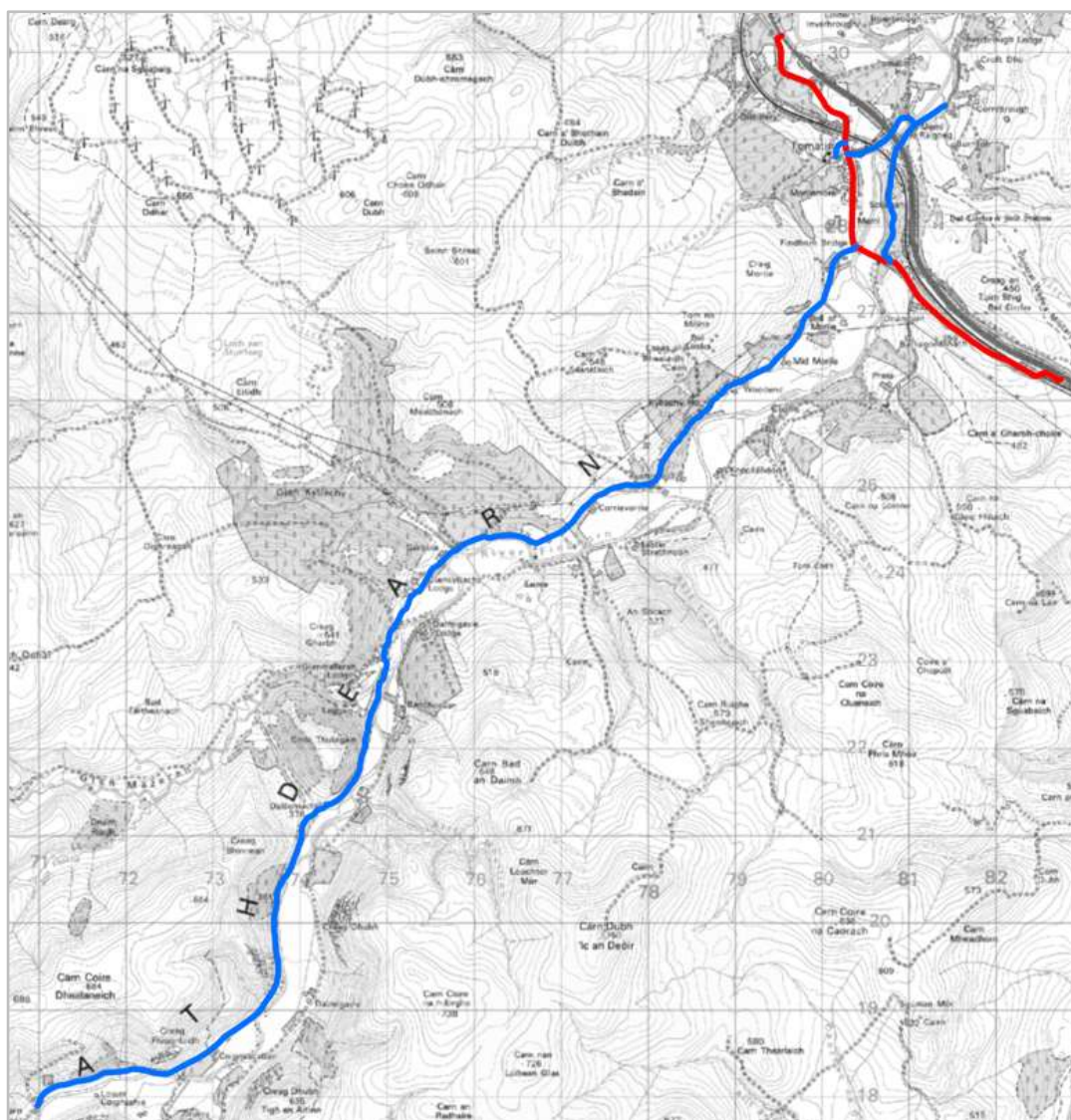

▪ Paths network – Over the past several years, SCD has created a network of paths in Tomatin and Moy. ○ Due to the speed reductions in Tomatin, several stretches of the community-built path network that include pavements are now on roads with a 20mph speed limit. Station Road, however, does not have a pavement and is mostly National Speed Limit (see also above in this table under <i>Roads – Station Road, Traffic calming, and Speed reduction</i>). ○ In mid-2026, the Moy community carried out works to improve the roadside walkway along the B9154 in Moy (see also above under <i>Paths</i>). ○ The way markers in Tomatin require new signage to reflect the change in bus stop location due to the A9 dualling work. ▪ Paths projects – Work carried out as part of the paths work in the local area includes: ○ Re-opening a forest track on Forestry and Land Scotland land on the east side of Loch Moy in 2019, including installing three benches. ○ Repairs to the roadside path through Moy, which included resurfacing and installing new culverts, and installation of two benches. ○ Creating a new off-road section from the Distillery entrance to the A9 bus stop (now redundant due to bus stop closing due to A9 dualling). ○ Installing a new pavement from the Strathdearn Hub to the bottom of Juniper Drive (constructed to Highland Council adoption standards)^{xxxxvii}. As this pavement is part of The Highland Council's adopted road portfolio, it will be the Council's responsibility for any remedial work, should any future repairs be required; regular kerb and gully cleaning will increase life span and function. ○ Creating a new off-road path to aid children accessing Strathdearn Primary School and walking to the Strathdearn Hub. ○ Installing a gate in the deer fence between Forestry and Land Scotland land and Dalmagarry Estate to enable access to Wade's Military Road. ▪ Hazelbank Community Wood – An upgrade to the smaller path loops is being considered, which could be suitable for off-road prams. Services ▪ Electric vehicle recharging – Electric recharging points are available at two locations in Strathdearn, at The Strathdearn Hub (car and bike charging) and at Tomatin Distillery. There is a bike maintenance station at The Strathdearn Hub. ▪ Water – A new water treatment works was installed in 2021 near the Findhorn Bridge in Tomatin, to serve Strathdearn. There are bore hole concerns for some private water supplies in the local area.

▪ Waste water treatment – IMFLDP2 (page 297) states that the treatment plant in Tomatin has limited capacity and encourages all prospective developers to engage early with Scottish Water to assess the impact of development and identify whether work is required to the current facilities. Many properties in Strathdearn have private wastewater arrangements, as indicated by the water registrations (shown as yellow diamonds) in Map 9. ▪ Superfast fibre broadband – Over the past few year, superfast fibre broadband has been installed to a large majority of the properties in Strathdearn. The community is planning to extend the superfast fibre broadband to all properties in the Strathdearn area. ▪ Mobile communications – The Strathdearn area can suffer from unreliable mobile communications; at least one mast is still powered by a generator. Route priorities

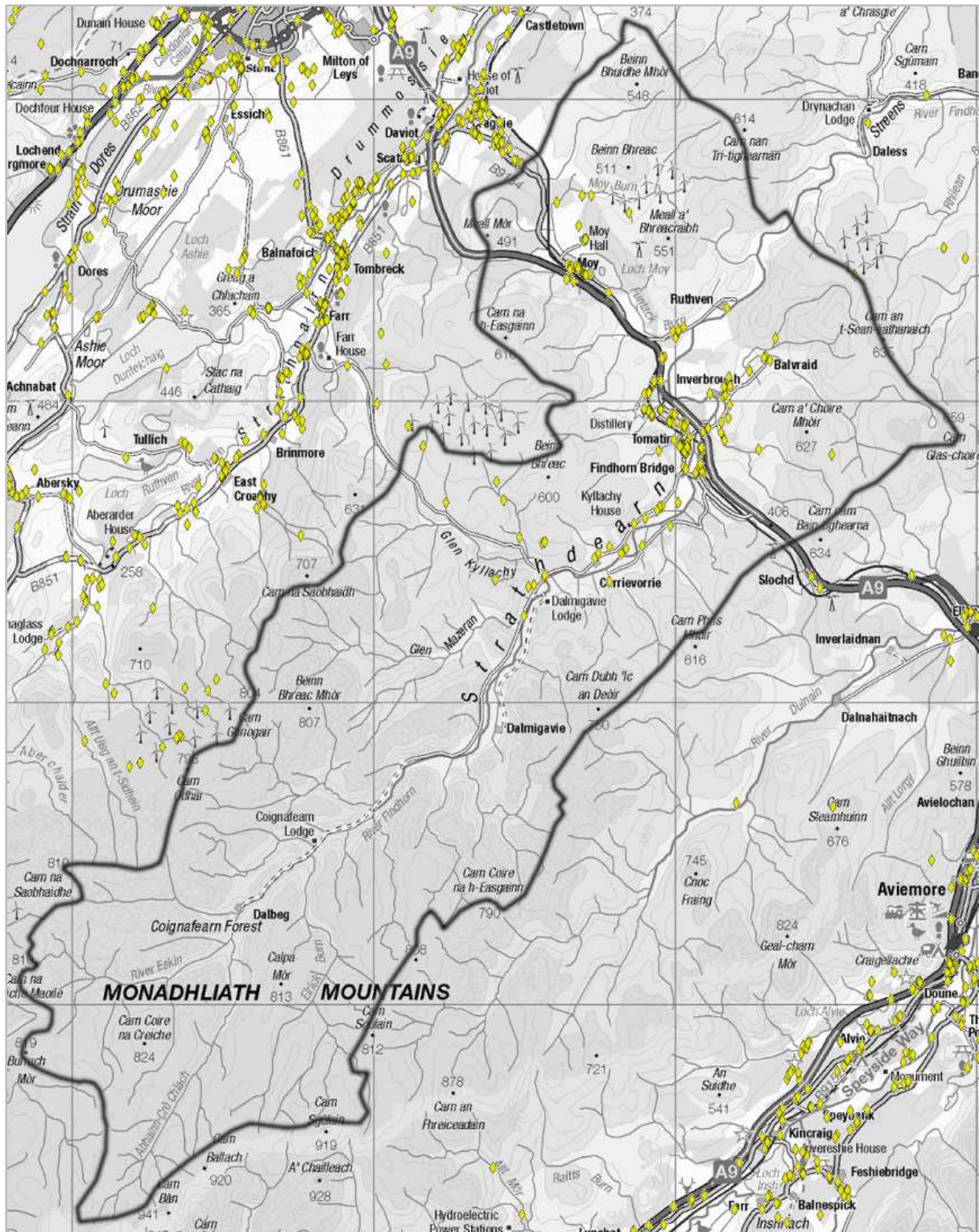
→ **Primary** (Highest) - Treated from 6am to 9pm Monday to Sunday, generally covering all the A class roads and some B class and including main commuter routes in the larger urban areas.

→ **Secondary** - Treated mostly after the primary network has been completed between 6am and 6pm Monday to Sunday and covering roads which in general connect smaller communities to the primary network. On bus routes, gritting will not necessarily be completed before buses start their journeys.

→ **Other** - These are minor rural and local access and residential roads. We will treat these roads as resources become available.

8 Our community actions

9 Our proposals for the development and or use of land and buildings

In line with the requirement of Section 1(3) of Schedule 19 of the *Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997*, as amended by Section 14 of the *Planning (Scotland) Act 2019*, this chapter of our Local Place Plan sets out our proposals for the development or use of land and buildings in Strathdearn.

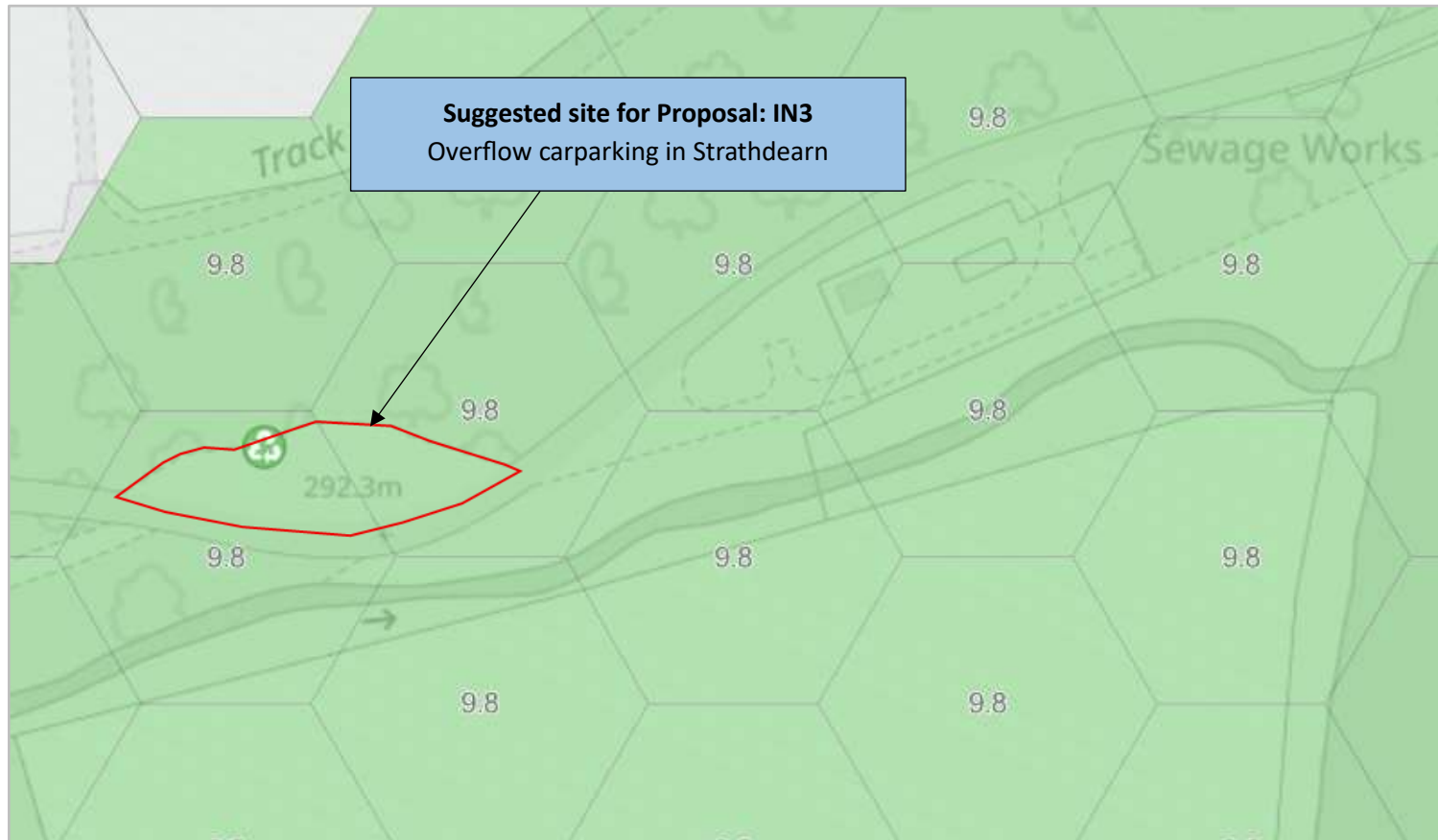

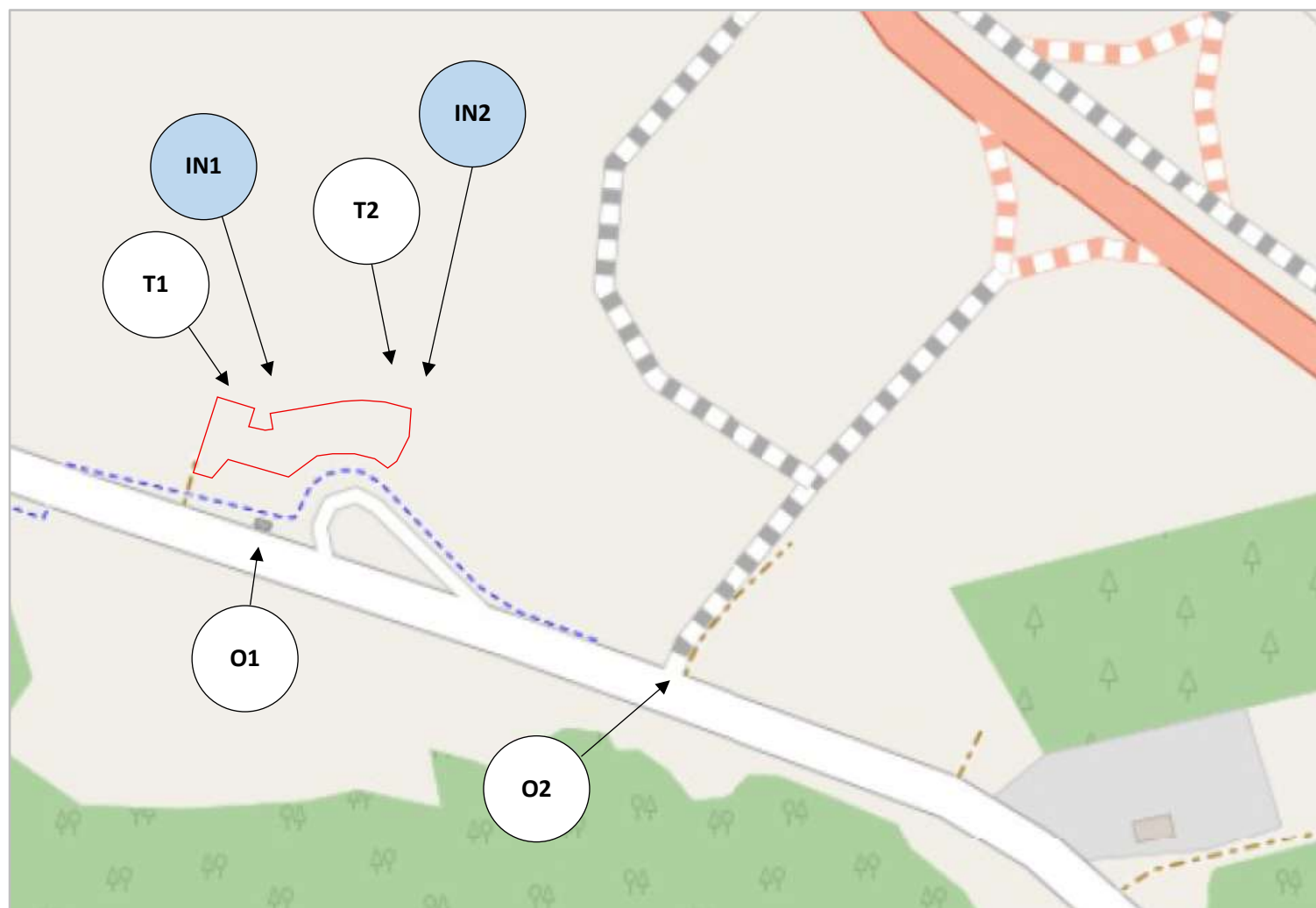
Map 10: Area used for overflow carparking area by the recycling point in Tomatin^{cxlv}

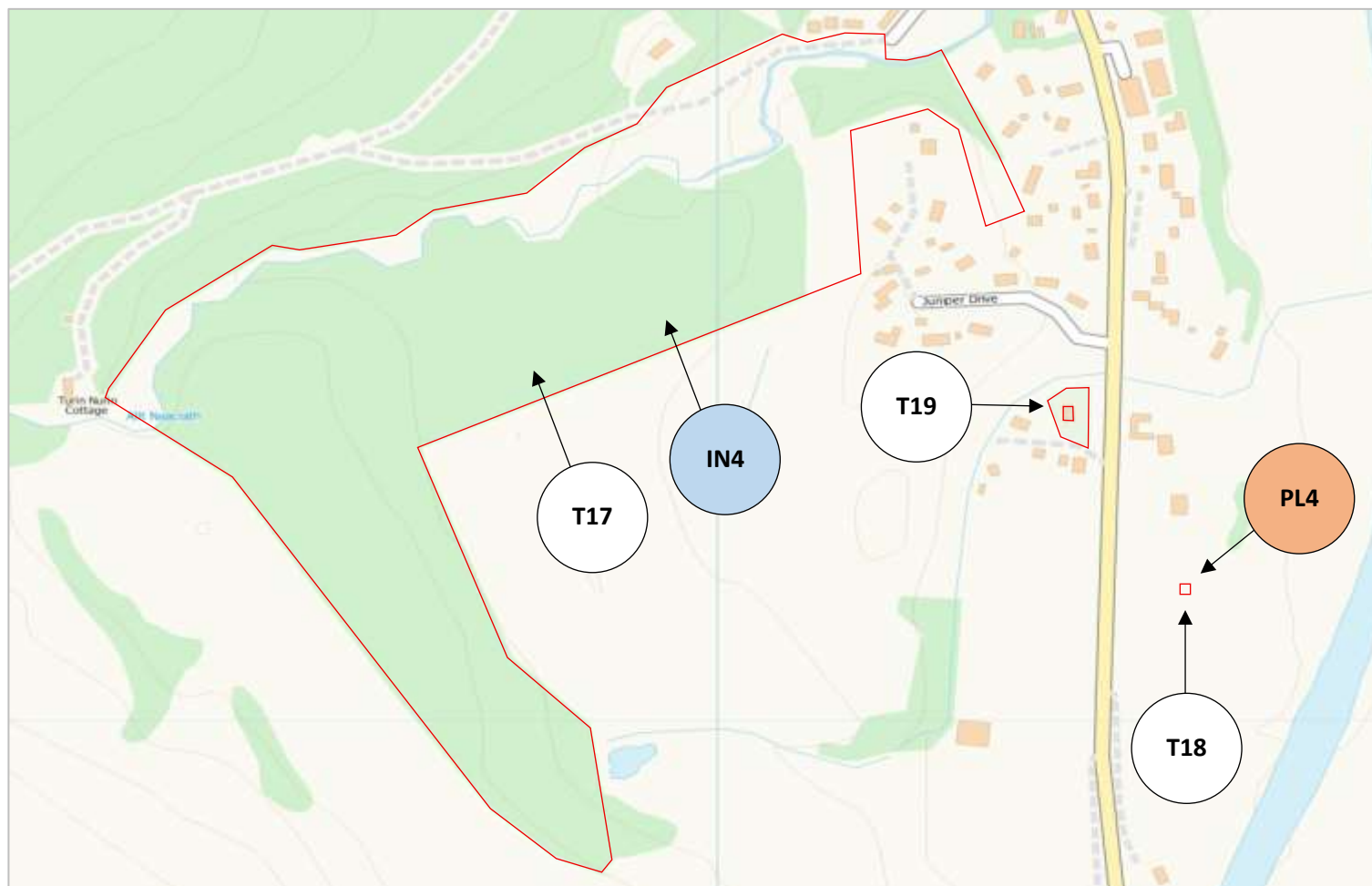

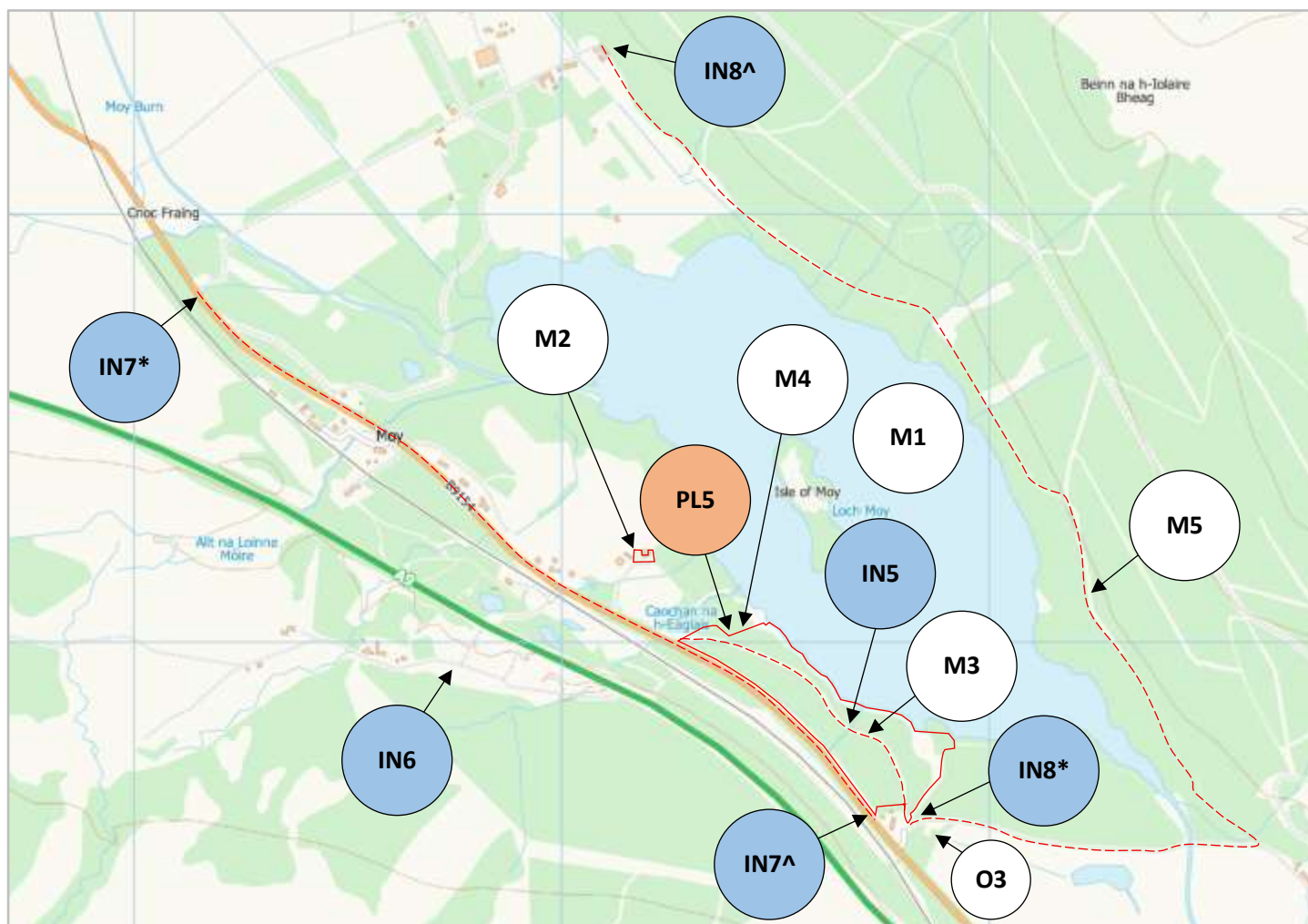

12 Making it happen

Key messages

This Local Place Plan sets out the five-year vision for the Strathdearn community from 2026-2031.

Some of the actions identified in the Local Place Plan can be started now by the community, such as maintaining walkways, discussing winter gritting and snowploughing with The Highland Council, and improving the appearance of Tomatin and Moy. However, many of the actions will require input from different organisations outwith the community and most of the actions will require funding.

Ongoing discussion with local landowners is seen as key to the continued exploration of common goals, and the progression of community aims and aspirations, of which many are dependent on the acquisition of land (leased and/or purchased) for their realisation.

It is hoped that owners of large landholdings in Strathdearn will integrate community actions and proposals from this Local Place Plan (including how they intend to aid their delivery) as part of meeting their community-engagement obligations in their Land Management Plans and five-year review schedules, as introduced in Part 1 of the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2025 and regulations^{clvii}.

Furthermore, this Local Place Plan notes that the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2025 contains provision to facilitate and aid ongoing timeous discussions on possible land transfers, lotting arrangements, requests to lease land (including any building on it) and registrations of interest such as the community and/or a community body might deem relevant. This Local Place Plan also notes the limitations on the capacity to respond to community engagement requests, particularly where volunteers and social factors like holidays or festive periods are involved. Similarly, where technical or professional advice is required. These should be factored into timescales.

Community planning partners

Strathdearn community hopes that this Local Place Plan will be used by public sector organisations, both in Highland and Scotland-wide (see listed below), to help support and deliver elements of the Local Place Plan, particularly in terms of planning, care in the community, public transport services, affordable housing, and protection of the environment. Monitoring and review

Strathdearn Community Council, in collaboration with Strathdearn Community Developments, will assess progress made on delivering the community actions and development proposals identified by the Strathdearn Local Place Plan at least annually. The Local Place Plan will be reviewed in its entirety after approximately five-years, which will be around 2031.
